### LETTER FROM THE MINISTER

Dear Friends,

Two occasions strike me as I begin to write today. The first is a walk I had last week, the second a meeting, both set me thinking.

The walk took me alongside some allotments. In fact many allotments all beautifully kept, all growing plants and food, all creating community, a close bonding friendly community of likeminded people.

The meeting reminded me of little children, young, untainted by society, innocent, making the most of life. These children also were being busy in community, were likeminded in getting along doing what was needed to be done, together sharing, learning. Seeds for the future.

Then I heard from the world. Financial markets in chaos, strife on our streets, gun and knife crime, drugs, the gang culture, war, villages, gardens and people being ripped apart physically and psychologically, being destroyed.

So I pondered. My mind created myriads of patterns, discernible and non-discernible, it went from hope to despair and back to hope. I pondered and in my pondering I thought of harvest.

Those allotments with their growing fruit and vegetables continually producing, having been given loving care. A love and care that transcended the vegetables themselves: reaching into the realms of the people's lives and creating a loving, caring community. What a harvest! A harvest as we often think of it in the produce of our land from seed to fruit. Also the harvest of life, from loving and caring, to community.

Then there are the children. What a harvest there! A harvest of hearts and minds, seeds for the future. How though can they be encouraged to be a part of a community of hope when they see so much of that community, a world of despair? How can we assist them so that they recognise how important they will be in creating and sharing in the harvest of peace and love in the future? How can we bring them to see this when before their eyes there is the pursuit of greed, hatred, torture and violence?

Surely there is only one answer and that is acting on what we believe. Proclaiming and ensuring through our own actions that kindness, love, caring should be pre-eminent in our lives giving them the right soil in which the seed that is themselves can be sown.

A child who is brought up with anger will be angry.

A child brought up in violence will be violent.

A child brought up without love will be loveless.

A child who is hurt will end up hurting.

Yet a child brought up with kindness, consideration, understanding and love will be a child with a chance of being so themselves and encouraging that in others.

Choose the soil for our children. Tend the seed well and our world will be a world that Christ and God will be justifiably proud and will be able to say: 'It is good'

# <u>' Love the Lord your God with all your heart, all your soul, all your mind and with all your strength, and your neighbour as yourself.</u>

### **CIRCUIT BOUNDARIES**

At our postponed Annual General Church Meeting held on 21st September Graham told us how circuit boundaries in Methodism were changing and getting larger following amalgamations.

There were many reasons for this. There was a shortage of ministers generally and, in particular, it was becoming difficult to find Ministers qualified and prepared to be Superintendents and to cope with the amount of administration now necessary; a fewer number of larger circuits would help in that fewer Superintendents would be required. Furthermore larger circuits would mean that more resources would be available within the circuit.

The Sydenham and Forest Hill Circuit, the Blackheath and Lewisham Circuit and the Bromley Circuit are having preliminary talks and discussing possible options. The talks may result in a larger circuit or they may result in churches joining other circuits.

There would be some advantages to our Circuit in being part of a larger circuit in that there would be more resources open to us, e.g. both the Bromley and Blackheath and Lewisham Circuits have larger numbers of local preachers than us.

Graham stressed that before any decisions are made the local Circuit Meetings, Church Councils and Church Meetings will be able to discuss the proposals and decide what they want to do.
