LETTER FROM THE MINISTER

Growing in Christ

Jesus said "I am the true vine, you are the branches. Those who abide in me and in in them bear much fruit, because apart from me you can do nothing" (John 15:4).

I spent almost two weeks of my holidays finishing off my MA dissertation. Part of my dissertation was to explore how our relationship with God shapes our lives and discipleship. I found that it is quite hard to grasp the true nature of our relationship with God, but comparing it to the relationships that we are familiar with helped me to understand the nature of divine and human relationship. Scripture uses many metaphors to describe our relationship to Christ. One of the commonly understood metaphors is the one Christ used in John 15, where Jesus is the vine and we are the branches and God the Father is the vinegrower. In this metaphor Jesus wants to have an abiding, long lasting and productive relationship with his people. When we remain in Jesus, we are fruitful, steadfast and strong but most importantly we are purposeful. The Father, the vinegrower not only gives us his spirit to sustain and abide in Jesus and his Word but also improves us by pruning. Those who continue to abide in Christ are the ones that bear much fruit for God. As the branch grows through its connection with the vine, our productivity depends on the nature of our relationship with Christ.

Roshan is nearly 6 months old now and we have started giving him solid food. The main purpose for this is to sustain his healthy growth and protect him from swallowing shoes, socks, stones etc. We are aware that if he is nour-

ished and protected now, the effects will be long lasting.

Similarly our relationship with Jesus is purposeful, nourishing and protective. Our abiding in Christ gives us the nourishment to grow and strength to enjoy happy times and overcome difficulties of life.

Abiding in Jesus is a supernatural experience. In this, we allow God to come and live in us as he allows to us to live in him through Jesus Christ. This intimacy of our relationship inspires us to follow his instructions and be safe. Christians do well when they are attentive to the Word of God. By being attentive to the word of God we also abide in his love.

When we obey his word we become his witness because our fruit will not be hidden. Our light will shine in dark places. The validity of the Christian gospel in the world's view is determined by the kind of relationship we have with God.

For us as a church it is important that we continue to grow in Christ by abiding in him and by following his Word we will remain in his love. Let God continue his work of nurturing, caring and pruning in us so we could produce much fruit for his glory. Our abiding relationship is a sign of our real faith as he said "if you abide in my Word, then you are truly my disciples" (John 8:31).

May you continue to grow stronger in Christ. Amen

Everybody Can Sing!

When I worked in the nursery with children under 5 years - I sometimes asked them "Who Can Sing?" Every child's hand would go up and they would shout out "I can sing!" They were all happy and willing to show you what they can do. Yet if I were to put the same question to a group of 11/12 year olds, I'd be lucky if 2 or 3 children put their hands up. It is a fact we all can sing! Somewhere along that road of growing up from nursery age of happy singing children they become shy, self conscious 11/12 years old. Has anyone told them that they can't sing? Maybe they have been laughed at by their peers? Are they judging themselves by others around them and the media? Or maybe they can sing but have set themselves a high bench mark which is unachievable? Maybe they are just too shy?

My daughter has always had a lovely singing voice. We have channelled this so she could use this talent in many different ways. When she was very young she would sing anywhere and all the time. She surprised us at her then primary school by forming a group called "Fusion" that did their own rendition of the song "Lean on Me" (by Bill Withers) Now she has reached that age of 12 years I feel her best singing efforts can only be heard in the shower. Her music teacher at school did not know he had a singer in his class until it was mentioned at parents evening........

I believe we are all artistic in some way or another. Jesus has given us all many talents and it is up to us how we use them. We as "grown ups" tend to sometimes impose limits on children, make assumptions - without thinking about it or perhaps for the best reasons with regards their artistic talents. However old or young you are, just the process of going through life, being told your piece of work was not up to scratch can undermine our self confidence and hide us from the reality of our God given Gifts. Maybe that is what happened to the man

who simply buried his Master's talents incurring his wrath when he returned! Just think about your own gifts and talents for a moment and ask yourself "When did I last Sing?"

COOKERY CORNER

Devonshire Flan

Serves 4-6

Ingredients

175gr (6oz) shortcrust pastry (made with 175gr (6oz) flour, 50gr (2oz) marg., 50gr (2oz) Trex or lard and about 3 tablespoons cold water.)

25gr. (1oz) butter

25gr (1oz) plain flour

½ pint milk

1 teaspn chopped parsley

100gr.(4oz) grated cheese

3 hard boiled eggs

50gr.(2oz) shelled prawns

parsley to garnish

Method

- Heat the oven to 400°F/200°C/Mark 6.
- 2. Roll out pastry to a thickness of ¼ inch and use to line a 20 or 23cm (8 or 9inch) heatproof dish or flan ring.
- Bake blind—line with greaseproof paper or foil and fill with baking beans or any other dried beans, 10 -15 minutes.
- 4. Make the parsley sauce—melt the butter in a pan, add the flour and stir well over a very low heat.
- 5. Remove from the heat, add the milk a little at a time, mixing all the time.

- 6. Return to a very low heat and bring slowly to the boil, stirring continuously, cook for a minute or two.
- 7. Add the cheese, prawns and 1 teaspn. parsley.
- 8. Bring back to nearly boiling point
- Pour into the hot pastry case and serve at once, garnished with a small sprig of parsley.

METHODIST CHURCH STRUCTURE

For those who are comparatively new to the Methodist Church it may sometimes be confusing to hear people talk of "the Circuit" or "the District". The following notes may help you to understand how it all fits together.

The Connexion

Methodists are linked together in a "Connexion" of churches, circuits and districts.

The local church

The local Church is the congregational place of worship, where Methodist members and attenders are nurtured, in our case Anerley Methodist Church.

The circuit

A circuit is a group of local churches, served by a team of local preachers and ministers including the superintendent minister.

Our Circuit is the Blackheath and Crystal Palace Circuit. Our Superintendent minister is the Rev. Stephen Maunder The churches in the Circuit, other circuit ministers, local preachers and circuit officials are shown on the Circuit Plan, produced once a quarter.

The district

The district serves a geographical group of circuits and is led by the district chair. Our circuit is in the London District, which roughly covers the area inside the M25.

The Conference

The annual Methodist Conference meets at different places (this year it was held in London) and is the supreme decision-making body of the Church.

PENGE WAR MEMORIAL

With the celebrations of the 70th anniversary of the end of WW2 in November 2015, a group of Penge residents has decided to commemorate our WW2 fallen soldiers, sailors and airmen and civilians by having plaques bearing the names of approximately 400 men, women and children who died in Penge in WW2 put up in their honour.

The project has already gained the support of Penge Partners, Penge Forum, local historians and local councillors, and work has started on the design and compilation of the names. The WW2 plaques will be sited around our largest WW1 memorial in the High Street outside Penge Recreation Ground and this will be the place where present and future generations can come and remember.
