FROM THE MINISTER

I don't know if any of you have made New Year resolutions, I wonder if they are going out of fashion. I have never made a New Years resolution but the beginning of this year has offered me a lot to think and do for God, for one another and for creation.

I would like to mention two things that I would see myself and churches under my care striving for.

1 Living in the Story of Christ

2 Stewardship of the earth

For me living in the story of Christ means to interpret my story, my experiences and my life and faith through the story that the church tells us about Christ. This would not mean that I will have some abstract rule or principles to guide me but it is a way of life, developing habits and practices through which I would strive to become gospel shaped. This would simply mean interpreting and reflecting on my life events and practices through Christ's incarnation, passion and resurrection. Placing my story in Christ's story would allow me and potentially my churches to reconstruct our story of faith, perseverance and hope in challenging and threatening environments that we and our communities face. A good example of this way of Christian living is Pope Francis. His humility and ambition to live in the story of Christ is changing the narrative of the Church and the way it is perceived.

Of course Pope Francis took the name of St Francis who created the first Nativity in the Italian City of Greccio. It was his way living in the story of Christ and enabling believers to take their own spiritual journey from Bethlehem to Jerusalem, from the manger to the

cross.

Now the second point; St Francis is also seen as the Patron of Ecology. St Francis had a great love for animals and the environment. However, it was the documentary called "Trashed" by Jeremy Irons that made me think about our disposable life style and the damage it is causing to our environment, threatening our very existence. This documentary highlighted how plastic packaging and waste have already been endangering marine life for decades and through poor disposal could increase toxins in our environment to shocking high levels causing illnesses, infertility and abnormalities. This documentary shows that all the existing sites around the world are already at tipping point and burning waste containing plastic is not a good alternative. I am only just realizing how much plastic waste just four of us produce. Almost everything we buy comes in plastic packaging. It will be a difficult task for us to reduce our waste, but Sarah and I are going to try to alter our habits to reduce it.

By this we will also be complying with the Methodist Church's waste policy which is

to reduce the production of material waste including unnecessary packaging

to encourage re-use, repair and recycling of materials including organic waste

to dispose of waste in a safe and responsible way

COOKERY CORNER

Individual Steamed Chocolate Puddings (serves 4)

Ingredients

150 gr.(5 oz) unsalted butter, softened
175 gr (6oz) light muscovado sugar
½ teaspn. Nutmeg
25 gr. (1oz.) plain white flour, sifted
4 tablespns. sifted cocoa powder
5 medium eggs, separated
125 gr. (4 oz.) ground almonds
50gr. (2oz) white breadcrumbs
To serve_Greek yoghurt, chocolate curls

Method

- Preheat oven to 180°F/ 350°C/ Gas mark 4, lightly grease and line the bases of 8 individual 175ml,(6 fl.oz) pudding basins with a small circle of non-stick baking parchment.
- 2. Cream the butter with 50gr.(2oz) of the sugar and the nutmeg until light and fluffy.
- 3. Sift flour and cocoa powder together and stir into creamed mixture.
- 4. Beat in the egg yolks and mix well, fold in ground almonds and breadcrumbs.
- 5. Whisk the egg whites in a clean grease-free bowl until stiff & standing in peaks, gradually whisk in remaining sugar.
- 6. Using a metal spoon fold egg whites into chocolate mixture and mix well.

- 7. Spoon mixture into prepared basins, filling two-thirds full to allow for expansion.
- 8. Cover each basin with a double layer of tinfoil and tie with string.
- 9. Stand pudding basins in a roasting tin and pour in sufficient water to come half way up the sides of the basins.
- 10. Bake in the centre of the pre-heated oven for 30 minutes.
- 11. Remove from the oven, remove tinfoil, loosen round the edges of the puddings and invert onto warmed plates.
- 12. Serve immediately with Greek yoghurt and chocolate curls.

NEWS FROM CASA RICCI SOCIAL SERVICES

Dear Friends

Joy is one of the most precious things we look for in our lives...Since the time of Father Luis Ruiz, it has always been at the heart of Casa Ricci's mission to bring joy to the poor and marginalised people in China. He believed that there were not many initial prerequisites for this Joy to occur.

The first and most important one is to start where the people we want to serve are actually standing (geographically, physically, psychologically, materially, spiritually etc) rather than where we would like them to be.

The second one is to have a willingness to open up ourselves to them, sharing with them what we have and what we are. Fr. Ruiz also believed that the first thing we have to share with the others is our very limited Joy, our limited capacity to make other people happier. He believed that Joy was contagious, so that we share our Joy with others, we open up the possibility for others to share their Joy with us as well.

The more we share Joy, the more we receive it. This virtuous cycle of sharing and receiving Joy is the main and continuous experience of our service in Casa Ricci's different communities. This mutual sharing of Joy does not eliminate pain, suffering or death from us, or from the thousands of people we serve in our leprosy villages, hospitals, children's homes, schools and kindergartens etc. But it transforms this suffering from something meaningless to something meaningful. The sharing of |Joy brings communion, and communion brings more and deeper Joy. singing or playing music together: each person adds his or her own unique voice to a choir in which all our voices become One. The more we share it, the more voices we add, the more beautiful the music becomes.

It is no wonder that one of the first things Fr. Ruiz did in Macau to bring Joy to the thousands of people who were then escaping war and hunger in the 50s, was to form a choir made up of these refugees. This group eventually would become the now very famous Macau "Perosi" a capella choir. In most of the CRSS communities and centres, to sing or to play music together is the way we celebrate life, and the way we greet or bless our guests...

This is what we share at Christmas—the coming of the One who has taught us how to share God's Joy to the World.

May His joy fill your hearts during the year 2015!
