MINISTER'S LETTER

After His resurrection Jesus spent approximately 40 days on Earth. During this time he appeared to His disciples various times explain to them the Scripture accompanied with many convincing signs and their role in spreading the message. But before his ascension Jesus asked His disciples to stay in the city until they have been clothed with power from on high (Luke 24:48). Disciples did follow Jesus' instructions and stayed in the city and as promised on the day of Pentecost while they were praying and fasting, the power of Holy Spirit was given to them.

The word Pentecost means "fifty" days. Christian borrowed it from Greek-speaking Jews who used it to refer to a Jewish holiday known as Shavuot (the Festival of the Weeks). Shavuot accrues fifty days after Passover and Hellenistic Jews gave it the name "Pentecost". Pentecost for Jews is associated with a season of grain and the day on which Torah (including 10 Commandments) was revealed by God to the nation of Israel at Mount Sinai. In Jesus time during the festival of Pentecost many Jews would gather from far and wide into Jerusalem to celebrate their festival holidays.

The book of Acts tells us that on the day of Pentecost, there were about 120 believers including the disciples who were praying and fasting in the upper room in Jerusalem, the Holy Spirit descended upon them and they began to speak in other languages. After this Apostle Peter spoke to a large crowd explaining the fulfilment of the prophecy by Joel (2:32-33) with the power of Holy Spirit and around the 3000 people committed themselves to follow Christ. We commemorate this event with the birth of the Church of Christ.

For us Christians today this Pentecost in many ways is associated

with a time of personal and corporate renewals. Pentecost offers us the opportunity to observe how the power from high is working through us and how by receiving the Holy Spirit afresh can deepen our intimacy and fellowship with God and each other. It can also be associated with our personal reawakening in which the mysteries of God's grace fill our hearts with courage and confidence.

Both John and Charles Wesley experienced these moments in which their hearts were "strangely warmed". Charles Wesley experienced his Pentecost on 21 May 1738 and three days later on 24 May, 1738 John Wesley had a similar experience in Aldersgate Street. Charles Wesley wrote in his journal that the Spirit of God "chased away the darkness of my unbelief". One of the possible conversion hymn asks "And can it be that I should gain an interest in the Saviour's blood" and the last verse proclaims

No condemnation now I dread, Jesus, and all in Him, is mine: Alive in Him, my living Head, And clothed in righteousness Divine, Bold I approach th' eternal throne, And claim the crown, through Christ, my own.

After their Pentecost both brothers served God as they were filled with the power from high. Charles went on to write thousands of Hymns and John was used by God to reform England, preaching the Gospel of Christ with the power of the Holy Spirit to all those who would listen.

At this Pentecost we might ask ourselves; What is the significance of Pentecost for us today? What might God want to do in our lives and in our Church on Pentecost?

As you spent some time reflecting on these questions,

"May God the Father bless you.

May God the Son heal you.

May God the Holy Spirit enlighten you,

and give you
eyes to see with,
ears to hear with,
hands to do the work of God with,
feet to walk with,
a mouth to preach the word of salvation with,
and the angel of peace to watch over you and lead you at last, by
our Lord's gift, to the Kingdom.

Amen." (A Dominican Blessing 13th Century) .



Thank you to Valerie, who has worked hard for several months collecting exhibits and putting it all together, and to Andrew who helped her set up the exhibition on the day.

The Thursday morning Prayer meeting

Prayer is an important dimension of our Christian faith and should underpin our individual lives and the life of the church. As Christians we should believe strongly in the power and effectiveness of prayer. The Bible commands us to pray without ceasing and to pray with the expectation that God will listen to, and answer our prayers according to His will.

We have just commenced meeting together at the church on a Thursday morning to focus on prayers for our world, our church, our community, each other and ourselves. The Prayer Meeting has been well attended and has been a blessing to all who have 'dropped in'.

What do we do at the Prayer Meeting? This is a time for sharing, meditation, quiet time and prayer.

At the start of the meeting we spend time quietening our minds and focussing our thoughts and prayers on God. We then spend time identifying specific issues that we as individuals, or as a group, feel led to pray for. Our prayers are then focussed on these issues. Confidentiality is important. There will be occasions where information divulged during a prayer meeting is 'confidential'. Prayer meeting attendees respect this requirement and treat all information with sensitivity.

The thought of a Prayer Meeting might be daunting to some Christians (most if we are being absolutely honest!!), but our prayer meetings are gentle and Spirit-led. There is no pressure on anybody to pray out loud if they do not wish to. Silent prayer, or just saying a sincere 'Amen' at the end of somebody else's prayer is just as acceptable to God.

We don't anticipate instant answers to our prayers and we don't expect God to answer our prayers in the way that we might humanly expect. Sometimes God does answers prayers in a spec

tacular way. One Thursday morning we prayed that a new teacher might be found quickly for Imran's village school in Pakistan. Recruitment was seen to be a potential problem. Within a week of praying, God had found **two** new teachers for the school and provided an unsolicited donation that would pay a teacher's salary for a full year! Coincidence or Godincidence? We have the faith that God directly intervened in this situation as a result of our heartfelt prayers.

If you are free on any Thursday morning between 10 and 11.30, come along to the church. Our Prayer Meeting is in the chapel. You can come for the whole meeting or 'drop in' and 'drop out' according to the time that you have available. Come along and be blessed, inspired and supported.

Sharing our burdens and concerns, and praying for each other, is important. If you are not able to attend the Prayer Meeting in person but have a prayer concern, please let Margaret or Peter Boreham know and we will pray for your concern. All are welcome to the Prayer Meeting, including members of our other Circuit churches.

Martin Luther made the following observation:

No one can believe how powerful prayer is and what it can effect, except those who have learned it by experience. Whenever I have prayed earnestly, I have been heard and have obtained more than I prayed for. God sometimes delays, but He always answers.

He also said *Pray and let God worry.* If you are stressed and worried about any situation "Take it to the Lord" in Prayer".
