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

NEWS FROM AN OLD MEMBER, received by David Hynes via the Church website.

Dear David

I have recently updated my computer and have discovered the delights of revisiting my old home town. I was born in Laurel Grove in February 1923, my brother in 1926 and my sister in 1929—all at the same address. We later moved to Seymour Villas in 1933 in time to see Crystal Palace burn down!

All the family were members of Anerley Methodist Church. My maiden name was Gibbins. My father became a Trustee (we had them in those days), My sister and I were members of the Girls' Life Brigade and my brother was a member of the Boys' Brigade. We all collected money for the overseas missions and I had my name inscribed on the Roll of Honour for collecting over £5 in one year, which was quite difficult to achieve in those days.

I well remember the night our dear church received two direct hits during the war, fortunately leaving the old building which had been the original church so that meetings could still continue. My father had suffered badly from shell shock in the first world war, and the constant bombing by doodle bugs and the later V2s sent him to pieces and we moved him to his brother in the country at Egham in Surrey, where it was reasonably peaceful.

I now live in a very peaceful village called Great Bentley in North East Essex on the borders of Suffolk. We have a small thriving Methodist Church in our village (I was received into Membership at Anerley when I was thirteen). Forgive me for writing but it is so nice to know that the old place is still there.

This year for the first time Gerald Hardy and I went along to the Pentecost festival in Millwall football ground on the 11th May; it is hoped that in 2010 it will be held in Wembley. During the festival the above statement was a recurring statement for both the young and old speakers.

The festival was filled with music including hip hop, which Gerald was bopping along to, praises and people talking about how the Christian faith had changed transformed their lives. This was a far cry from hard wooden pews (or the nice chairs in Anerley) and stuffy services. The festival was bursting out of the church walls and dancing into Millwall football ground. During the week in The Times 8th May the writer writes that the Christian faith is dying because of the empty pews in the church. The Times writer and readers should have come along to Millwall Football ground and seen the huge groups of both young and young out worshipping God.

During the festival we kept praying for our capital and for knife crime which is killing our young people, and also praying for our church, that it will grow. However, many writers that I have researched have argued that the answers to the above prayers can be found that, as Christians, we are more busy **DOING** church rather than **BEING** church. Being church is much more than sets of rituals or the minister, church is the life of Jesus on display through his people.

As an F.E teacher I often have deal with and teach teenagers who feel that they have failed in life, because they have not achieved "good" grades or other problems in their lives. Being a teacher and Christian I witness to these troubled students about the Christian faith through my character and attitude to help make a world a better place; as Paul writes, we are all ministers of the church, we are the church.

A MESSAGE FROM MACAU

Andrew Tredinnick has received the following letter from Father Luis Ruiz, whose work in Macau and China is supported by members of our congregation by donations to Joan's "tin" and by the Christian Action Group.

Dear Andrew

Many thanks for your generous donation of £359.15 sent in January via Jesuit Missions to our dear lepers who are so grateful to you for your loving help. I send you this grateful letter which I discovered in my files. It is really nice.

"Dear Fr. Ruiz: We are the old, crippled patients in Wah Peng Rehabilitation Centre. We had been sent here for isolated treatment after getting this disease. Due to lack of medical treatment, most of our hands and legs are worn out, and our place is far from the city with inconvenient transportation and unfertilized. Our life is very difficult. The houses which were built by the government many years ago are old, broken and damaged by dampness. We receive 50 RMB from the government per month and no other support. We depend only on the eggs from the hens, not for eating, but for exchanging some other materials such as salt etc. We have no other way to change our living condition.

In September 1997 you and your co-workers, accompanied by the officials of the Region Government, Health Department and Skin Disease Preventive Centre Directors, came to visit us and it was an unforgettable time. At that time, the weather was extremely hot and it was a rainy season, the rugged road was difficult for walking. You firmly came to visit us and grasped our hands tightly, and showed concern about

The website is a resource for the Church to use in its working life and mission. It has an improved search engine—with a stronger visual structure so people can get to what they want—quickly and easily.

For those who know little about Methodism, there is a concerted attempt to communicate the best of Methodism. This includes a new section on what is distinctive about Methodism.

The website aims to give all users what they are looking for in an easily accessible way, and offer inspiration and encouragement wherever possible. It is a tool to support people in their discipleship and journey with God.

You and your co-workers are very good people in our hearts and we wish to express our gratitude to you all. Now our patients greatly appreciate your kindness and love, and your smile which we will remember in our hearts for ever. May you and your co-workers be peaceful, happy and healthy.

Be assured of my prayers for you and your dear ones. May the Risen Christ bless you and grant you a renewed life filled with love, hopes, peace and good health.

A WORD IN TIME: ONLINE BIBLE STUDY

In September, as part of the new-look Methodist website an online Bible study called *A Word in Time* was launched.

Available to internet users throughout the Connexion (and beyond) *A Word in Time* includes a daily Bible reading with commentary, thoughts and questions which empower the ordinary reader to make sense of the passages themselves.

The Bible is a central part of our faith, but with our hectic twenty-first century lifestyles, it's often easy to neglect this essential part of our Christianity. With this exciting new online feature, we are trying to encourage the reader to apply the Bible to their own life and the social and political context in which they live.

Fifty-two writers, from an extensive range of theological and social backgrounds across the Methodist Church, have each contributed a week of studies to the project. Watch out for the blog attached to the commentary, enabling users to post their own comments and thoughts on the featured passage.

The Bible passages are the same as the lectionary in the Methodist Prayer handbook, *All Things in Christ*. This brings all (40,000 plus) readers of the Prayer Handbook, and indeed all of the Methodist Connexion, together as disciples and students of the Bible.

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A word in your ear...

• The Methodist Church has now launched *A Word in Time* as an audio Bible study

A Word in Time, the online Bible study for daily life, was launched at the beginning of September and has been hugely successful, with around 300 visitors to the site every day.

But now the team have decided to make the studies even more accessible. An audio file of each day's Bible study, and a bigger file with all of the studies for each week can easily be downloaded onto a computer or mp3 player, so that users can listen at a time convenient to them.

Alison Pollard, Web Writer and Researcher and the new voice of *A Word in Time* says; 'People find it increasingly difficult to make time to read and reflect on the Bible in today's busy world. *A Word in Time* made it easier by giving people access to a Bible study on the internet. Now we've taken it to the next level and you can catch up with your daily Bible study at a time most convenient to you – whether you're cooking dinner, doing your weekly shop or on the daily commute to work.'

Each audio file is available in two formats – a high quality version for those using broadband internet connections and a lower-quality file for those using a dial-up connection. The audio files for past Bible studies are available online in the **Word in Time** archives.

The audio Bible studies are also ideal for sharing with those who otherwise might not have access to daily Bible notes, perhaps because of a disability or simply not having access to the internet.
