LETTER FROM THE MINISTER

Friends, the cross must become a vital part of your everyday life. Why? Because you have three relentless enemies you must overcome each day: sin, Satan, self. Friends, how do you overcome them? By living the crucified life. Paul writes, 'I have been crucified with Christ; it is no longer I who live, but Christ lives in me'. You say, it's too difficult to live a Christian life. No, it's not difficult, it's impossible. The only way is to let the power and person of Christ live through you. That's why Paul wrote, 'God forbid that I should boast except in the cross of our Lord Jesus Christ, by whom the world has been crucified to me, and I to the world' (Galatians 6:14)

After years in a Russian labour camp, Aleksander Solzhenitsyn became so depressed that he wanted to die. Laying his shovel down, he walked over to a bench and sat down, knowing that any moment a guard could come by and use that shovel to beat him to death. It was then that a fellow inmate took a stick, and in the sand at Solzhenitsyn's feet traced out the sign of the cross. As he stared at it, his entire perspective shifted. Realising the cross represented the greatest power in the universe, he slowly got up, picked up his shovel, and went back to work under the sign of the cross. And you must do that too. Friends, each day remind yourself: 'Jesus died for me. I died with Him and He lives in me. When He lives in me, I can live for Him'. That's the secret of a victorious Christian life.


WORLD DAY OF PRAYER SERVICE

4. Some tall stories

When spending a few days at Milford-on-Sea in Hampshire, we saw advertised a combined boat and bus ticket enabling us to sail from Lymington to Yarmouth on the Isle of Wight and then offering a day pass on the open-top service which followed a circular route between Yarmouth and the Needles.

We drove to the ferry terminal at Lymington where we left the car and took the ferry, as foot passengers, across to the Island. Several other people joined us on the top deck of the bus which was waiting for us when we arrived. Soon after the journey commenced a taped commentary started, highlighting some of the features we were passing. The site of the first major pop festival in the country (I think in 1968) was pointed out, and that "topping the bill had been The Wombles!" Now I'm not any expert on pop music but I'm sure that's not right. The commentary continued as we journeyed on and it was difficult to know what fact and what was fiction.

Those of you that have been to the Needles will know that cars are not allowed to use the narrow access road which climbs above Alum Bay to the site. However the bus is permitted to make the journey. As we ascended round several hairpin bends, with a steep drop on the seaward side, our driver announced: "I suffer with vertigo so I've closed my eyes!". As you can imagine this evoked screams and shouts from many of the passenger on board.

We got off at the top and after inspecting the Needles and former military buildings, now in the hands of the National Trust, we took a high level stroll across Tennyson Down back

to Freshwater Bay, where we joined a later service on the circular route, so we could enjoy again the thrill of negotiating the hair-pin bends. Each driver seemed to have developed his own patter to embroider the 'official' commentary.

Returning to Yarmouth we passed the grounds of a substantial house, and heard, "When the poet Tennyson moved to the Island, he would have been happy with a 'two up and two down', but his wife insisted on this mansion!"

We had a very entertaining day.

A Policeman's Lot How Times have changed? Perhaps an unusual topic for a church magazine but maybe you will find this interesting. Sadly guns and shootings are all too familiar on our streets today. Less so in the early 1970's when I qualified as an 'authorised firearms officer' Back then officers were not routinely armed except for those quarding

embassies or engaged in close personal protection. Today of course police firearms are much more visible and there are armed patrols immediately available with the authority to 'self arm' when required.

I guess I never really thought that one day I might be required to actually shoot someone! Great fun firing at targets in the basement of Old Street Police Station or at the range on the marshes in Rainham but on the streets would be an entirely different thing.

One day, minding my own business on the beat on the Walworth Road (yes once upon a time police officers did actually walk the streets) information came over the radio that an armed robbery was taking place at a bank in Camberwell. Was there an authorised firearms officer available? I volunteered. Soon I was swept up by the Area Car and conveyed with blue light and two tones – not towards Camberwell and the scene of the robbery – but in the opposite direction to Carter Street Police Station.

There I presented myself to the Station Sergeant and showed him my authorisation card. The Sergeant solemnly opened the station safe and produced a 'six shot' Smith & Wesson handgun and counted out 12 rounds of ammunition. Which I duly signed for. I loaded the gun and placed it in a holster around my waist – no body armour in those days! Back in the Area car we sped back towards Camberwell where I guess I was supposed to engage the robbers! Well as you can imagine, by the time this pantomime of drawing weapons had run its course, much to my relief, the robbers were long gone. So back to Carter Street to sign the gun back and count the bullets for the Sergeant to sign for in the ledger.

I guess the nearest I ever came to firing a gun in action was some years later, following the night time burglary of a sporting goods shop in Fulham Road. We learned that the villains had run into a flat on a Peabody Estate. With others, having gone through the ritual of drawing firearms we arrived at the scene and as the senior officer I led the search of a darkened flat. I entered a dimly lit bedroom and with my firearm drawn and loaded I knelt down to look under the bed. To my horror a suspect was lying spread-eagled under the bed with a handgun inches from his hand.

Fortunately the suspect was compliant and did not move towards the gun – had he done so I dread to think what would have happened – I suppose I would have had to shoot. After the search we discovered that the gun was in fact a replica – looks like the real thing but not capable of firing. Had I shot him, I guess a subsequent trial or enquiry would have expected me - as an 'expert firearms officer' to have been able to identify that the weapon was only a replica! "Excuse me sir, is that gun you are pointing at me real?" BANG!

Weekly Thursday Morning zoom Bible Study Finding 'The Way' together.


Thursday mornings 10.00am to 11.00am facilitated by Margaret Boreham

We will keep you updated on the progress of the playground and garden.


