FROM THE MINISTER

Friends, I greet you with the grace and peace poured into our lives by God our Father and our Master, Jesus Christ. And what a blessing indeed is the One whose coming we await.

Advent simply means 'coming'. And friends, God is coming! Our LORD Jesus is coming; Christmas is coming! Over the next four weeks in Advent, Old Testament prophets, and some reflections from excerpts of Dietrich Bonhoeffer's prison dairies, helps us to look forward the fulfilment of God's purposes for His chosen people. A time when the greatest, most profound, tenderest thing in the world will be fulfilled.

Dietrich Bonhoeffer was the German theologian and pastor, who was imprisoned and later killed by the Nazis. From prison, he writes, "celebrating Advent means being able to wait. Waiting is an art that our impatient world or age has forgotten." He writes further that "whoever does not know the austere blessedness of waiting, will never experience the full blessing of fulfilment. Those who do not know how it feels to wait patiently, to look forward with anticipation until the truth is revealed, cannot even dream of the splendour of the moment in which clarity is illustrated for them. For the greatest, most profound, tenderest thing in the world, we must wait, and it happens according to the divine laws of sprouting, growing and becoming! But not everyone can wait", says Bonhoeffer. "The people who cannot wait are those who carry restlessness around with them and look to the greatness of this world. Thus", he says, "Advent can be celebrated only by those who know that they are poor and incomplete, and who sense something of the greatness that is to come; the Holy One Himself. God in the child in the manger!"

He adds, "we can, and should also celebrate Christmas despite the ruins around us", to his family.

For us, and for millions of Christians, the birth of Christ brings a new way, not just of understanding life but of living it. And so, in midst of all the ruins of our unjust world, let us look forward to rejoicing in coming of our LORD Jesus Christ, the Prince of Peace, and the One who reveals the face of God to us, and who is the Word of God for us! Finally, a note of thanks your forbearance in my first few months or quarter. I am very much aware that change is not an easy process at the best of times, and would encourage us all to continue pray for guidance, both as you adjust to a new minister and also in our discernment for a vision for our Church.

To this end, and on behalf of Matthew, I'd like to wish you patience in your waiting this Advent, a very Happy Christmas and peaceful New Year.

Looking ahead

December 1st – World Aids Day

We pray for all who are affected by HIV/AIDS. We especially remember the estimated 13 million children around the world orphaned by AIDS, and those who care for them, in our Gift Service on Sunday 3rd December.

Covenant Service: 14th January 2018

This idea of Covenant was basic to John Wesley's understanding of Christian discipleship. He saw the relationship with God in Covenant as being like a marriage between human beings (both as a community and as individuals) on the one side and God in Christ on the other (cf. Ephesians 5.21-33).

His original Covenant Prayer involved taking Christ as "my Head and Husband, for better, for worse, for richer, for poorer, for all times and conditions, to love, honour and obey thee before all others, and this to the death". Wesley recognised that people needed not just to accept but also to grow in relationship with God. He therefore emphasised that God's grace and love constantly prompts and seeks to transform us, and so we should continually seek and pray to grow in holiness and love.

Week of Prayer for Christian Unity 2018

The Week of Prayer for Christian Unity is traditionally observed from 18th to 25th January. Introduction to this year's theme and background has been produced in the Caribbean. There are 1.4 Million Christians living in the Caribbean region, across a vast geographical spread of island and mainland territories. They represent a rich and diverse tapestry of ethnic,

linguistic and religious traditions, with a complex variety of governmental and constitutional arrangements.

The Holocaust Memorial Day – 27th January 018

The Holocaust Memorial Day Trust (HMDT) is the charity that promotes and supports Holocaust Memorial Day (HMD). 27 January is the day for everyone to remember the six million Jews murdered in the Holocaust, and the millions of people killed in Nazi Persecution and in subsequent genocides in Cambodia, Rwanda, Bosnia, and Darfur. 27 January marks the liberation of Auschwitz-Birkenau, the largest Nazi death camp. HMD we can honour the survivors of these regimes of hatred and challenge ourselves to use the lessons of their experience to inform our lives today.

THE ORIGINS OF HARK, THE HERALD ANGELS SING

The 1739 version of "Hark, the Herald Angels Sing" as printed in Hymns and Sacred Poems, entitled "Hymn for Christmas-Day"

Hark, how all the welkin rings, "Glory to the King of Kings; peace on earth, and mercy mild, God and sinners reconciled!"

Joyful, all ye nations, rise, join the triumph of the skies; universal nature say, "Christ the Lord is born today!"

Christ, by highest heaven adored, Christ, the everlasting Lord: late in time behold him come, offspring of the virgin's womb!

Veiled in flesh the Godhead see, hail the incarnate Deity! pleased as man with men to appear, Jesus, our Emmanuel here!

Hail, the heavenly Prince of peace, Hail the Sun of Righteousness! Light and life to all he brings, risen with healing in his wings.

Mild he lays his glory by, born that man no more may die; born to raise the sons of earth; born to give them second birth. Come, Desire of nations, come, fix in us thy humble home; rise, the woman's conquering Seed, bruise in us the serpent's head.

Now display thy saving power, ruined nature now restore; now in mystic union join thine to ours, and ours to thine.

Adam's likeness, Lord, efface Stamp thy image in its place. Second Adam from above, Reinstate us in thy love.

Let us thee, though lost, regain, Thee, the life, the inner man; O, to all thyself impart, Formed in each believing heart.

Charles Wesley requested and received slow, solemn music for his words, far from the joyful tune we know today. He wanted the same tune as the Easter hymn "Christ the Lord is risen today,"

According to early records the Wesleys footed the bill to have this hymn printed at Christmas 1743.

The original hymn consisted of 10 4-line verses.

George Whitefield thought the word "welkin" (vault of heaven) was too esoteric and amended the first two lines to what we are now familiar with – "Hark the herald angels sing, Glory to the new born King." Whitefield did this without reference to Charles Wesley, who was **not amused.** Charles resented the unbiblical picture of angels singing.

The Wesley brothers were not altogether happy about the changes

made to any of their hymns, including "Hymn for Christmas-Day". Here's what John wrote in the preface to the 1779 edition of *A collection of Hymns for the use of the people called Methodists:*

" Many gentlemen have done my brother and me (though without naming us) the honour to reprint many of our Hymns. Now they are perfectly welcome to do so, provided they print them just as they are. But I desire they would not attempt to mend them; for they really are not able. None of them is able to mend either the sense or the verse.

"Therefore I must beg of them one of these two favours; either let them stand just as they are, to take them for better for worse; or to add the true reading in the margin, or at the bottom of the page; that we may no longer be accountable either for the nonsense or the doggerel of other men."

Then there is the question of the tune and the addition of the refrain and the creation of eight line verses, which came about for musical reasons. Almost 100 years after the hymn's composition, Mendelssohn composed a Cantata – *Festgesang* – celebrating the 400th anniversary of Gutenberg's invention of moveable type. A chorus from the cantata was adapted and paired with Wesley's text by an English musician, Cummings. (Mendelssohn was adamant that his music was not to be used for religious purposes!)

The final four stanzas of Wesley's original are usually omitted as they are theologically and biblically dense with allusion.


Just four examples of the aid given by OXFAM over the past 75 years.

COOKERY CORNER

Yorkshire Parkin

Ingredients

125gr (4 oz) butter175gr. (6 oz) black treacle150ml (¼ pint) milk175gr. (6 oz) medium oatmeal175gr. (6 oz) self-raising flour125 gr. (4 oz) dark muscovado sugar2 level teaspoons ground gingerI medium egg, beaten18cm (7 in.) tin, lined with greaseproof paper

<u>Method</u>

- 1. Pre-heat oven to gas mark 2, 160°C, 320°F,
- 2. Place the butter, treacle and milk into a pan, heat gently until butter has melted.
- 3. Add the flour, oatmeal, sugar and ginger, then beat in the egg.
- 4. Pour mixture into the lined tin and bake in the centre of the oven for 1 hour, or until the centre of the cake is firm to touch.
- 5. Remove cake from the oven and leave to cool in the tin for 15—20 minutes, then transfer to a wire rack to cool completely.
- 6. When cold, wrap in clean greaseproof paper, then foil, and keep in a cool place for 3 to 4 days before eating.


