
Have a most refreshing summer.



BETTER TOGETHER

On Sunday 18th April Andrew Tredinnick, Anita Yusuf and I attended a meeting at Forest Hill Methodist Church of the Circuit and Church Stewards from the Blackheath and Lewisham Circuit, the Bromley Circuit and the Sydenham and Forest Hill Circuit.

The purpose of the meeting was to continue the consideration by the lay representatives in the Circuits of getting together, working together or finally amalgamating the Circuits. The meeting was addressed by two members of the Orpington and Chislehurst Circuit, which has recently been formed from the amalgamation of the Chislehurst and Sidcup and the Orpington Circuits, and they spoke to us about their experiences and of the benefits and drawbacks they had encountered. On the whole it would appear that that the amalgamation had been beneficial and any hitches, such as amalgamating the circuit accounts, had been dealt with satisfactorily without too many problems.

However, although it was not brought up at the meeting, it would seem that in some ways their situation differed from ours. Only two circuits were involved, covering a smaller area, and, on the whole, the demographics of the two original circuits were very similar. In the case of our possible amalgamation, the area covered is larger, stretching from Deptford to Keston. Furthermore, the churches involved vary from inner-city churches to suburban and semi-rural. In addition, the new Superintendent of the Bromley Circuit has expressed some doubts about the proposals in their current form. The Circuit Stewards will be meeting again in July to consider how we should proceed.

JARS OF GRACE

During Lent several of our congregation took part in the "Jars of Grace" appeal by UNICEF to raise money to help children in Mozambique, and we raised a total of £74.85. The following letter has been received from UNICEF.

"Dear Mrs. Young

"Thank you so much for the £74.85 you raised together with your church for UNICEF's *Jar of Grace* appeal. UNICEF's income comes entirely from voluntary donors, so we value fundraisers like you immensely.

"The money raised through *Jar of Grace* will help provide basic survival measures for children in Mozambique like vaccines and mosquito nets. LETTER FROM MACAU

Those of you who donate money to Joan Loring's "tin" each month will know that it goes to help the work of Father Ruiz of Casa Ricci Social Services, a Roman Catholic body based in Macau, with projects in many parts of China. Father Ruiz is a Portuguese priest who had worked in Macau and China for many years and is still going strong at the age of 98! Andrew has received the following letter dated 22nd March 2010 from Father Ruiz:

"Dear Andrew,

Happy Easter! Alleluia! Alleluia! First I want to thank you for your continuous help during all these years. Drop by drop is creating the little channel, which is running continually to China for all the lepers, the Sisters and the Aids victims. We need one million RMB (147,100USD) per month, and it comes—a real miracle.

It was a reality by going to see again my dear lepers well dressed, with new houses and nice meals prepared by the loving Sisters and they were very happy to see me so young at my 98 years of age, God's miracle.

It was a special consolation to see my adoptive daughter, who without hands and legs had to go for water, today is very happy with the love and care of the Sisters.

One of our employees who went to visit the lepers with Fr. Azpiroz last Christmas wrote this: "One patient in particular made a deep impression on me. His legs are covered with wounds and his hands have no fingers. His face and eyes are deformed, He had to be pushed in a wheelchair to the door to have a look outside. I saw the loving Sister come to dress his wounds. Later we asked him to sing a song "One Road". His singing was so beautiful that I felt sure God was pleased..."

Another work we do silently is the care for the Aids children, over 50 in different houses. Thank God who has given us Sisters to take care of them. Now the government starts to send the abandoned children to us.

I send you the activities of the mobile clinic*, which is restoring vision to the blind. We pay all the expenses for the work.

Daily Fr. Azpiroz and I keep you and your dear ones in our Masses and prayers, especially during the Holy Week.

May the risen Christ bless you with an increase in faith in Him and a renewal of love for our poor brothers and sisters.

*Fr. Ruiz enclosed a document giving a summary of the Mobile Eye Unit three year project, which was carried out in cooperation with other organisations, including the China leprosy Association (CLA). During the 3 years the Unit travelled 160,000 km to 14 provinces; the farthest north is Jinlin Province near to Russia and the southernmost area was Sanya in Hainan Island. In 3 years 530 people had cataract extractions and 794 had eye lid correction surgery to save their sight, 3,241 cases were examined, diagnosed and some were given training in self-care. Training of Sisters took place twice in Han Zhong. Work has been difficult with a shortage of nurses. Currently one technician does all the functions of two nurses.

During the next 3 year project it is hoped to expand the service to include Fujian, Jiangsu, Zhejiang, Shandong and possibly Tibet, but this will only be possible if CLA makes the arrangements. It is also hoped that another nurse can be provided.
