It was provided by the Rev. Wally Stratford, a Minister from the Uniting Church of Australia, who spent a year in our Circuit with his wife Mary before returning to Australia.

The Newsletter shows pictures going back to the 1950's. In Syria 800,000 people were fleeing unrest and seeking shelter in tents and caves. Since 2015 a camp in Jordan is housing 79,000 refugees where OXFAM is providing water, toilets and hygiene activities. In Raqqa, Syria they are providing safe, clean water to vulnerable families in an unofficial settlement in Lebanon.

COOKERY CORNER

Spring Chicken Pie

Cooking time 20—25 mins. Oven temp. 425°F/220°C/Gas mark 7

Ingredients

1 small pkt. sage & onion stuffing
175gr (6oz) cooked diced chicken
100gr (4oz) sausages, cut into pieces
15ml (1 level tablespn) plain flour
1 X 225gr (8oz) packet of thawed puff pastry

Method

- 1. Prepare stuffing as directed on packet, divide mixture into 8 and shape into balls.
- 2. Fry stuffing balls and sausages in melted butter until golden, remove and place into a fairly deep pie dish.
- 3. Stir flour into remaining butter and cook gently for 1 minute, gradually blend in the stock.
- 4. Bring to the boil gently, stirring well, season with salt and pepper.
- 5. Add chicken to sauce and pour over stuffing balls and sausages..
- 6. Roll out pastry and use to cover the pie, brush with beaten egg or milk and bake.
- 7. Serve hot with fresh vegetables

Action for Children



Communion on the moon

Man first walked on the moon in 1969. I remember as a schoolboy watching this historic event on a hopelessly grainy black and white television.

Before astronauts Neil Armstrong and Buzz Aldrin stepped out of the lunar module onto the surface of the moon on July 20, 1969, Buzz Aldrin unpacked a small plastic container of wine and some bread. He had brought these communion elements to the moon from Webster Presbyterian church near Houston, where he was an elder. Aldrin had received permission from the Presbyterian church's general assembly to administer it to himself.

Aldrin radioed to NASA (National Aeronautics and Space Administration) from the moon:

"I would like to request a few moments of silence ... and to invite each person listening in, wherever and whomever they may be, to pause for a moment and contemplate the events of the past few hours, and to give thanks in his or her own way."

He then ate and drank the elements. He later wrote:

"I poured the wine into the chalice our church had given me. In the one-sixth gravity of the moon the wine curled slowly and gracefully up the side of the cup. It was interesting to think that the very first liquid ever poured on the moon, and the first food eaten there, were communion elements."

Budd Aldrin also read a section of the gospel of John:

'I am the vine, you are the branches. Whoever remains in

me, and I in Him, will bear much fruit; for you can do nothing without me.'

The story of the secret communion service only emerged after the mission was successfully completed. Aldrin had originally planned to share the event with the world over the radio. However, at the time NASA was still reeling from a lawsuit filed by a firebrand female atheist, resulting in the ceremony never being broadcast.

After the Apollo 8 expedition crew had read out the Genesis creation account in orbit, this influential and prominent atheist demanded a ban on NASA astronauts practising religion on earth, in space or "around and about the moon" while on duty. She believed it violated the constitutional separation between church and state.

The atheist's legal case against NASA eventually fizzled out. However, at Webster Presbyterian church – the spiritual home of many astronauts – Aldrin's communion service is still celebrated every July, known as Lunar Communion Sunday. During this service the church replay the tape of Aldrin on the moon and recite Psalm 8, which he had quoted on his return trip to Earth ("... what is man that thou art mindful of him"). The church still holds the chalice that Aldrin brought back with him. The atheist who had vehemently opposed Aldrin's actions died a tragic death, she, her son and granddaughter were murdered by an employee in 1995.

Astronaut Buzz Aldrin stuck to his personal Christian faith, absolutely determined – in spite of opposition - that man's very first visit to the moon should include a celebration of the Lord's Supper. What a wonderful Christian witness!

Ricci Social Services

Several members of our congregation support this Roman Catholic charity working in Macau by donating to "the Refugee Tin" which Andrew looks after. If you would like to become a donor, please see Andrew and he will tell you more about it. In January we were able to send £453 which had been collected in 2016, and we have received the following letter of acknowledgement.

"Many thanks for your generous donation of £453 sent to us through the Jesuit Mission Office in London, to support our mission to serve the poor and marginalised people in China. May God bless you abundantly and repay you in his special way.

"This year will be a special year for us, as we prepare ourselves to celebrate our 30th anniversary in October. While China is becoming a world superpower, their economic and material development is not necessarily integrated with a sound social and spiritual development. There is still a rather individualistic and materialistic understanding of what it means to be human, which impoverishes all values. There is a big need of witnesses of solidarity, so we still have an important contribution to make. We do this with continued dialogue and collaboration with the government and other NGOs, an effort that requires wisdom, understanding, stead-fastness and a lot of patience.

"More than 60 religious Sisters are serving every day in 22 centres. They serve daily more than 600 persons affected by leprosy living in leprosy centres, by taking care of their daily needs. They serve daily in two big hospitals, taking care of HIV patients. And they serve daily in our three children's homes, taking care of children with HIV/AIDS. Our work extends also to another 40 leprosy centres, improving

the living standards of the additional 1,500 patients who live there. We provide them with a monthly stipend, which allows them to have better food at least once a week.

"Even as we go about our daily work, new and urgent social care needs call us to new fields of service. Air, soil and water pollution are big problems in China which cause poverty and death to people today and to future generations. There is a pressing need for environmental education to empower Chinese people to learn new ways of living, consuming and producing that treat Earth as our common home, and not as an object of exploitation. During this year, we plan to start a project to introduce eco-farming and environmental education in Lufeng, a rural county located in Yunnan Province, the southern-most province of China (3,000 km from Beijing).

"...I pray for you and your family and your community, and ask you to pray for us, so that we may carry forward all these works, which our Lord has entrusted to us, with wisdom and courage.
