

#### THE MOON AND GOD.

Fifty years ago (July 20, 1969), two human beings changed history by walking on the surface of the moon.

But, what happened before Buzz Aldrin and Neil Armstrong exited the Lunar Module is perhaps even more amazing, if only because so few people know about it. This is the fact that Buzz Aldrin took communion on the surface of the moon. Some months after his return, he wrote about it in Guideposts magazine.

The background to the story is that Aldrin was an elder at his Presbyterian Church in Texas during this period in his life; and, knowing that he would soon be doing something unprecedented in human history, he felt that he should mark the occasion somehow. He asked his minister to help him and so the minister consecrated a communion wafer and a small vial of communion wine. Buzz Aldrin took them with him out of the Earth's orbit and onto the surface of the moon. He and Armstrong had only been on the lunar surface for a few minutes when Aldrin made the following public statement:

"This is the LM (Lunar Module) pilot. I'd like to take this opportunity to ask every person listening in, whoever and wherever they may be, to pause for a moment and contemplate the events of the past few hours and to give thanks in his or her own way." He then ended radio communication, and there, on the silent surface of the moon, 250,000 miles from home, he read a verse from the Gospel of John, and he took communion.

Here is his account of what happened:

"In the radio blackout, I opened the little plastic packages which contained the bread and the wine. I poured the wine into the chalice our church had given me. In the one-sixth gravity of the moon, the wine slowly curled and gracefully came up the side of the cup. Then I read the scripture: 'I am the vine, you are the branches. Whosoever abides in me will bring forth much fruit ... Apart from me you can do nothing.'

"I had intended to read my communion passage back to Earth, but at the last minute [they] had requested that I not do this. NASA was already embroiled in a legal battle with Madelyn Murray O'Hare, the celebrated opponent of religion, over the Apollo 8 crew's reading from Genesis while orbiting the moon at Christmas. I agreed reluctantly."

"I ate the tiny host and swallowed the wine. I gave thanks for the intelligence and spirit that had brought two young pilots to the Sea of Tranquility . It was interesting for me to think that the very first liquid ever poured on the moon and the very first food eaten there were the communion elements."

"And, of course, it's interesting to think that some of the first words spoken on the moon were the words of Jesus Christ, who made the Earth and the moon - and who, in the immortal words of Dante, is Himself the "Love that moves the Sun and other stars."

I cannot walk for more 2 or 3 minutes even in the house before the pain makes me sit again. It is the same with standing. ......Kathleen works hard to look after me but it is very tiring for her. She gets good healthy exercise by walking the dogs every morning but I cannot do things like some cooking and cleaning which I could when she was at work. We have to pay someone to make our repairs on the house. We have lived here so long now many things need painting or mending."

#### OXFAM - PLEDGED GIVING

On your behalf I recently sent £247 to OXFAM for their work and had a most interesting letter in return thanking us for our contribution. I want to share part of their letter with you;

'One of the things that your donation can help with is innovation in our provision of vital sanitation. Some examples of this are the eco toilet and the pee power toilet.

Our tiger work toilets and urine diversion toilets are easy to build, even on rocky or boggy ground. Tiger worms in toilet tanks reduces waste by digesting it, while diversion loos separate waste hygienically and with no smell and produce compost communities can farm with. Both cut the risk of diseases spreading when toilet pits can't be dug, and they save cash because they need to be emptied less often and last longer than pits too.

Pee Power technology uses fuel cells containing live bacteria that turn urine into electricity. We're already using Pee Power to light toilets, and we're investigating whether it could charge mobile phones or light whole camps. Living in a refugee camp is always hugely stressful, and many people have told us they feel unsafe using unlit areas at night. As such, these innovative toilets could play a major part in helping people feel more secure.' Very basic, but very important and vital.

#### **COOKERY CORNER**

#### Butterscotch Flan

#### <u>Ingredients</u>

#### Sweet Flan Pastry (Paté Sucrée)

225gr (8oz) plain flour 2 eggs

25gr.(1oz) sieved icing sugar 150 gr (5 oz) margarine

A little cold water if needed

#### **Filling**

100 gr (4 oz) soft brown sugar

50g (2 oz) cornflour

2 tablespns honey

1/4 pint whipping cream

2 egg yolks

25gr (1 oz) margarine

2 tablespns honey

1/4 pint whipping cream

#### Method

- 1. Sieve flour into a bowl and rub in margarine.
- 2. Beat egg yolks, make a well in the flour, add eggs and mix well.
- 3. Gradually draw in flour from the sides and work it in with the tips of the fingers
- 4. Add icing sugar to make a firm yet soft dough, adding a teaspoon or two of cold water if necessary
- 5. Cover and leave to cool and relax.
- 6. Heat the oven to 400°F/Mark 6/ 200°C
- 7. Line a fluted 18 cm (7 inch) fluted flan case with the pastry and bake 'blind' (with dried beans).
- 8. Put sugar and cornflour (blended with a little milk) and the

- rest of the milk into a pan.
- 9. Cook slowly until the mixture thickens, stirring all the time, then remove from the heat.
- 10. Beat the egg yolks and stir in, followed by the margarine and the honey, cook for a further few minutes and leave to cool.
- 11. When cold, pour into the cooked pastry case.
- 12. Decorate with firmly whipped cream on top of the filling.
- 13. Scatter toasted almond flakes over the cream.

As many of you know, I am a Heritage Steward at Wesley's Chapel. You do not need to be an expert on John Wesley to be a Steward, as you will be given background information to read, and you will spend a little time shadowing other Stewards. The Chapel, Mu-

seum and House are open from 10am to 4pm and Stewards are asked to volunteer for at least two days a month, on days to suit you. There are usually three volunteers on duty each day, and many of them come from Methodist Churches in the London area.

It is interesting showing visitors around the Chapel and House, meeting visitors from other parts of the British Isles and overseas. It is also interesting finding out more about the history of the Methodist Church and about John Wesley and the beginnings of Methodism.

Please think seriously about whether this is something you could do. The number of volunteers has dropped considerably over the last year and if there are no Stewards on duty, the Museum and House cannot open.
