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FROM THE MINISTER

Advent

Advent marks the beginning of the Christian year. It is the four weeks before Christmas, beginning on December 1st this year. This is the Church's New Year's Day. The word 'Advent' comes from the Latin **'adventus'** which means 'arrival' or 'coming'. This time for Christians is a season of hope and the period of preparation for celebration of the birth of Jesus. They also look forward to the time that Jesus will come again.

The clergy wear and pulpit fall usually changes to purple during Advent. There are often no flowers decorating the church, but it is customary to have an Advent Crown also known as an Advent Wreath. These are made from a circle of evergreen plants such as holly and ivy which symbolises a God with no beginning or end. The evergreen is a reminder that God does not change. The holly is also a symbol of the crown of thorns that Jesus wore when he was crucified. Four candles are fixed round the circle and another is placed in the middle. Various colours of candles have been used such as three purple and a pink with one white in the middle. The unlit candles represent darkness. One purple candle is lit on the first Sunday of Advent. On the second Sunday, it is lit again together with another purple one, and in some traditions the pink candle is lit on the 3rd Sunday as this used to be the Sunday in the Roman Catholic lectionary when the entrance Introit, "Rejoice (gaudete) in the Lord always, again I say, rejoice", has been used. It is reminding us that the end of Advent is almost here, and we are joyful. So, this Sunday used to be known as 'Gaudete Sunday'. finally, on Christmas Day, the white candle is also lit representing Jesus Christ as the light of the world.

The Festival of Nine Lessons and Carols: 6.30pm 22.12.19

I have always been passionate about the King's College Festival of Nine Lessons and Carols since discovering it in the 80s and this is why. The

first Festival of Nine Lessons and Carols was held on Christmas Eve 1918. It was planned by Eric Milner-White, who at the age of thirty-four had just been appointed Dean of King's after experience as an army chaplain which had convinced him that the Church of England needed more imaginative worship. Many of those who took part in the first service must have recalled those killed in the Great War when it came to the famous passage 'all those who rejoice with us but on another shore and in a greater light'.

The pattern and strength of the service, as Dean Milner-White pointed out, derives from the lessons and not the music. 'The main theme is the development of the loving purposes of God ...' seen 'through the windows and words of the Bible'.

It can be hard at times for us to see the loving purposes of God in our complicated and at times violent, selfish and unloving world, having just observed Remembrance Sunday and al that it symbolises. Christina Rossetti expressed her faith in the message of Christmas as follows:

Love came down at Christmas, Love all lovely, love divine; Love was born at Christmas, Star and angels gave the sign. Worship we the Godhead, Love incarnate. love divine; Worship we our Jesus: But wherewith for sacred sign? Love shall be our token, Love shall be yours and love be mine, Love to God and to all the world Love for plea and gift and sign

Is there someone calling out for our love this Christmas? Is there someone we need to forgive or with whom we need to be reconciled?

When we send our greetings to our friends and relatives, is there

someone else we could include this Christmas? It doesn't have to be someone we know. Why not join with charities such as Amnesty International in sending greetings to those imprisoned unjustly? Or when we gather with friends and family for meal times, is there a neighbour we could include who is lonely? For in so doing, we would be shining a light in the darkness and bringing love into another's life. The story of Christmas is about barriers being broken down and we show our love of God in how we care for our sisters and brothers.

The Opening Prayer (Bidding Prayer) from the Kings College Carol Service reminds us that Christianity is about looking beyond ourselves:

let us pray for the needs of the whole world, and all people; for peace upon the earth Christ came to save; for love and unity within the one Church he did build; for goodwill among all peoples. And particularly at this time let us remember the poor, the cold, the hungry, the oppressed;

the sick and them that mourn; the lonely and the unloved; the aged and the little children;

May our preparations and our celebrations be truly inclusive this Christmas time. Meanwhile, I look forward to seeing you at our Carol Service.

THE METHODIST COVENANT SERVICE

In the Roman Catholic and Anglican traditions there is a service for the renewal of Baptismal vows which often takes place on Easter Eve. In the Methodist Church the equivalent is the annual Covenant Service. John Wesley (1703-1791), himself an Anglican clergyman, saw the relationship between God and humanity as essentially covenantal. On December 25th, 1747, John Wesley started the principle of urging his followers to renew their Covenant with God. His first formal Covenant Service was held on 11th August 1755. John Wesley used words from Joseph and Richard Alleine. John Wesley published his first Order of Service in 1780. This was revised by the British Wesleyan Methodist Conference in 1880, and then in 1936, after the various branches of Methodism had reunited. More recently it was revised in Britain in 1975 and then in 1999. However, John Wesley's original version is still the basis for the current orders of service. It is a distinctively Methodist liturgy, although other denominations now make use of it. Its words have a profound meaning. It is now traditionally held on the first Sunday of the New Year, or as near to it as possible and includes the Sacrament of Holy Communion.

The most famous prayer in the Covenant Service is the prayer of commitment, written by John Wesley:

"I am no longer my own, but yours. Put me to what you will, rank me with whom you will: put me to doing, put me to suffering; let me be employed by you or laid aside for you; exalted for you or brought low for you; let me be full, let me be empty; let me have all things; let me have nothing. I freely and wholeheartedly yield all things to your pleasure and disposal. And now, glorious and blessed God, Father Son and Holy Spirit, you are mine and I am yours. So be it. And the covenant now made on earth, let it be ratified in heaven."

The phrase in this traditional prayer that gives most cause for concern is "put me to suffering". By this, Wesley did not mean that we ask God to make us suffer, but that we desire, by God's help, actively to do or patiently to accept, whatever is God's will for us. I look forward to the most every year and I hope to see as many of you at our annual Covenant Service on Sunday 19th January 2020 at 11am. But of course, all



We have received the following letter from Living Well, who were the recipients of out Harvest gifts this year.

A huge thank you for Harvest donations 2019.

I am writing to thank you for your generous Harvest donations to Living Well Bromley. We have been so encouraged by your generous support, and the support of our community. Our container is near to bursting and extra donations have had to be stored in the church.

The timing has been perfect as we are seeing increasing numbers of people come to the food bank which is a trend seen nationally. As winter approaches, we expect a further increase in demand with people having to make the difficult choice between heating their homes or eating.

COOKERY CORNER

West Country Pudding

Serves 5 - 6. Cooking time 1 hour. Oven temperature 375°F/ 190°C/ Gas mark 5

<u>Ingredients</u>

Pastry

175gr (6 oz) self-raising flour 75gr (3oz) suet Water to mix

Topping

40gr.(1¹/₂ oz.) margarine 75gr (3oz) soft brown sugar

Filling

675gr (1½ lb) cooking apples, cored and sliced. 50gr (2 oz) sugar

Method

- 1. Mix together dry pastry ingredients with sufficient water to make a firm but pliable dough.
- 2. Cream together topping ingredients and spread on the bottom of a well-greased 900ml (1¹/₂ pint) pie dish.
- 3. Roll out $\frac{2}{3}$ of the pastry and use to line the dish.
- Fill the dish with sliced apples, sprinkle with sugar, fin-4. ishing with a layer of apples.
- Roll out the remaining pastry to cover the apples and 5. seal the edges firmly.

- 6. Bake in the centre of the pre-heated oven, on a baking tray, for about an hour or until golden.
- 7. Turn out the pudding on a large dish, the sauce will run out and cover the dish.
- 8. Serve hot with custard or cream. Enjoy!

Penge Churches Housing Association (PCHA)


In October PCHA celebrated its 50th Anniversary with a special reception at Portcullis House, Westminster, hosted by local MP, Robert Neill. Some seventy guests, including past & present board members, staff, tenants and supporters joined together to celebrate the achievements of the past 50 years. There was a moving video presentation featuring an existing tenant who shared her experiences of having been without a home of her own until being helped by PCHA.

The Association was formed by a group of volunteers drawn from the churches in Penge & Anerley concerned about the state of the housing market and the difficulty local people were experiencing obtaining affordable accommodation. The problems highlighted in the television docu-drama shown at the time – *Cathy Come Home* – touched hearts across the country and prompted many people to try to 'do something' to help. Most of the issues raised then are still with us today, with a huge number of Londoners unable to get onto the property ladder or afford private renting, while many more have to live in overcrowded and unsuitable housing.

PCHA started with just one property, but over the years has steadily developed and is now responsible for nearly 270 units, with plans to deliver another 40 homes during the next five years. Being a small social homes provider means that it is able to maintain closer and more personal relationship with tenants than is possible with larger organisations.

Members from both our church and Upper Norwood church have been involved with the Association throughout almost its entire existence, with several having served on the board of management, committees and the Friends' organisation. Anerley church is also a shareholder.
