FROM THE MINISTER

'Praise be to the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, who has blessed us in the heavenly realms with every spiritual blessing in Christ.' Ephesians 1:3

Friends,

It was a real blessing to see so many of you at the recent online service celebrating the Church's 156th anniversary during which the church looked at its past and future. An Imam once explained in a lecturer at theological college, the Islamic belief of 'looking back to steer into the future'. A little like using the rear-view mirror, for avoidance of obstacles in order to reach our onward desired destination.

Having recently celebrated Easter, Ascension and Pentecost, my reflections look at the work of the 'Holy Spirit and discernment', what this meant for the early Church and ours today, in Acts 6:1-6 and John 20:19-23. This requires a joint effort, however, with you reading the passages before continuing on!

One way that Luke makes a connection between the Holy Spirit and the fledgling Christian community in the early church, was by looking at the process of human decision-making. The mission of the early Church was inspired and guided by God through the Holy Spirit at Pentecost. And Luke carefully describes a number of these decisions – the election of Matthias, the decision to continue preaching despite persecution, the choosing of seven men, including Stephen, as deacons, and the acceptance of Paul as an apostle by the community of Christians in Jerusalem.

In the Gospel of John, as the group of dispirited followers of Jesus gathered and locked themselves in an upper room, there was fear and suspicion. John tells us that Jesus breathes the Holy Spirit on his disciples and commissioned them to continue his ministry of peace and forgiveness.

At Pentecost, the Holy Spirit which fired the apostles, is the same Spirit which is to fire and enthuse us to look ahead. As the Church celebrated its 156th anniversary, looking back, and celebrating a building that holds memories and tells stories of its forebears, the Spirit at Pentecost is not only a celebration of the Church's birthday and its past, but a call for disciples to open their lives and the love of God to steer its future, as the Imam's teaching. At Pentecost, they are not to simply to celebrate their decorated sacred enclosures but are to pass over into the lives of other people, the gifts of the Gospel and to proclaim to all how they have been changed by the past and the power of the Holy Spirit.

For Luke-Acts, the Spirit is the power of God, the mighty burning wind that blows the church's future into **NEW** and unexpected places of ministry. I wonder where such a Spirit might blow in our church? And can we pray, that as disciples of Jesus, the windstorm of the Spirit, may blow our church, and us, along with it to new unexpected places, and unexpected grace. It may only be in retrospect and with inspiration, that we can look back and recognise where the Spirit's wind is driving us.

The central importance of the Pentecost message in our 'discernment', is the Spirit's transformation of the church into a NEW community. At Pentecost, the transforming Spirit was given to all of them, apparently not just the few, but a larger community of 120 described in Acts 1:15, even the lowest in the household will be claimed by God and will become God's servants and God's prophets. This is what it means to be Church; this is the identity given to all by the Spirit's claiming, calling, and empowering. 'I have chosen you out of the world, so that you might go out and bear fruit; fruit that will last.'

The surprise of Pentecost is to fully comprehend what, by God's grace, is meant by "everyone". God calls us all, by name, however unsuitable or unworthy. As we reflect on the story of the Holy Spirit at Pentecost and the appointment of deacons, how might we discern the will of God, and what can be learned from our forebears in Acts and Anerley in its future mission? John's Gospel speaks of the group of dispirited followers of Jesus

who gathered and locked themselves in an upper room with fear and suspicion. In contrast, the powerful image of the Holy Spirit, is not halted by locked doors or locked hearts; nor exclude herself from the restrictive areas that people settle in. Instead, and in both accounts, the Spirit takes this group of dispirited followers and fires them with a **NEW** energy and a **NEW** enthusiasm and a **NEW** authority.

May the LORD recreate in us all his Spirit of unity to dwell in the Church, and that all peoples can, with one voice may Church learn the powerful language of the Spirit of God in preserving the past, that all will be given the opportunity to experience appreciation for their particular gifts in discerning its future. **AMEN**

Dear Friends,

I hope you are keeping well and making the most of the lift of some of the Covid restrictions.

After Christmas, the Living Hope Schools were closed for another 2 months but at the end of February, the school resumed again. It took students a few weeks to get back into their school learning. As we are aware, financially the lockdown has not been easy for many families and it has hugely impacted young people. Sadly 5 of our students have stopped coming to school as they had to help their parents with their earning.

All the measures are still in place to make the School COVID Secure. We have created a safe learning environment at the school. They have been provided with face masks, hand sanitizers, and seating arrangements that are socially distanced.

The New school year at Living Hope School starts at the end of March. All the students have worked hard to move to the next level. We are pleased with their progress despite their long absence from the school. Technology has become essential with social distance learning. With the generous financial support from Rev David Withworth and his Church called One Kingdom Mission (Georgia, USA), we have bought 4 tablets and a large TV Screen. This has been hugely beneficial to their learning and Living Hope School is very grateful for their generosity. I would have been thanking them in person as I had planned to spend a part of my sabbatical in Georgia but due to travel restrictions and other practicalities, I am staying in the UK. When I am allowed, I hope to spend time with some religious communities in the UK. After my sabbatical, I will be moving to my next appointment in Paisley near Glasgow where I will be ministering to three churches there.

We are hoping to buy at least 10 more tablets soon. It is a huge expense but we are sure of God's provision. Living Hope is extremely grateful for your continued support and prayers. Please especially remember the five students who have left the school for personal and economical reasons. With your support, we will continue to help and support our students and the local community. We are instilling hope and confidence in young minds and the impact of this will be greater than our current circumstances.

COOKERY CORNER

Apple Bread Pudding

(serves 4-6)

Ingredients

1 tablespoon milk50gr (2oz) sultanas2 large eggs½ level teasp'n ground cinnamon100gr (4 oz) fresh breadcrumbs25gr(1 oz) sugar450gr (1 lb) cooking apples, peeled and grated25gr (1 oz) margarine or butter15ml (I tablespoon) oil

18cm (7 in) frying pan with lid.

Method

- 1. Lightly beat together milk and eggs in a bowl.
- 2. Add the breadcrumbs, apples, sultanas, cinnamon and sugar.
- 3. Mix together well to form a dough
- 4. Heat margarine or butter and oil in the frying pan
- 5. Turn the apple mixture into the pan and press down evenly.
- 6. Place a lid or large plate over the top of the pan and fry gently for 10—15 minutes, checking that the underside does not over- brown.
- 7. When the first side is cooked, turn out onto an oiled plate then slide it back into the pan, uncooked side down.
- 8. Cook gently for a further 10—15 minutes
- 9. When cooked, sprinkle the Apple Bread Pudding with caster sugar and cut into wedges.

This pudding is delicious served hot or cold
