

## FROM THE MINISTER



## Mary: voice of joy

'My soul glorifies the Lord and my spirit rejoices in God my Saviour, for he has been mindful of the humble state of his servant. From now on all generations will call me blessed, for the Mighty One has done great things for me – holy is his name'.(Luke 1. 46-49)

These words, spoken by Mary when she visits her cousin Elizabeth, are commonly known as Mary's Song or The Magnificat (short for the Latin, *magnificat anima mea dominum* – my soul magnifies the Lord). It is a song of unspeakable joy, an outpouring of praise and the most magnificent psalm of worship in the New Testament.

Mary could have been as young as 13 or 14 when he encountered the angel Gabriel. She was probably poor, used to a life of working the land and daily household duties. Certainly, as a woman, she would have had little or no status in a patriarchal Jewish society; women had no role in society other than to bear children. Mary had no say in her future, and, like other Galilean women, her husband would have been decided on and negotiated by the senior men in her wider family.

So, having already been betrothed to Joseph, her unexpected pregnancy would have come as very unwelcome news. Mary's life had been mapped out and now everything had changed. Maybe this is why she is sent to visit her cousin Elizabeth for about three months while things

'settled down'. It's a recipe for social disgrace and yet, when the two women meet, there is an explosion of joy and celebration.

Elizabeth, having already experienced God's blessing, is filled with the Holy Spirit and immediately proclaims the blessing that is upon Mary. Mary responds with an outpouring of joy and praise to the Lord. Women in a remote corner of Palestine at that time had no opportunity to read or write; instead they would have relied on oral tradition- they used their voices. The women in the wider family would spend much of their time together, singing psalms, chanting verses, reciting passages, worshipping and praying together, the older women retelling their stories and events from the scriptures.

Mary would have been immersed in scripture and would intimately know the Torah (the first five books of the Hebrew Bible), for guidance, comfort, instruction, worship and praise. Her words resonate with the generous voices of other women- from Miriam on the deliverance of the Israelites from Egypt to Hannah's voice in the famous hymn of praise she creates for the birth of Samuel (! Samuel 2:1-10)

Mary's song is a beautiful mosaic of Old Testament verses woven together, announcing that God has acted to bring Israel a messiah. Her song wonders at the generosity of God to his people and how blessed she is to receive his favour.

As was customary in Jewish prayers, Mary recites God's past faithfulness to his people; she recalls how God has helped Israel and kept his promises. Now her child is to become the living fulfilment of God's saving promise. Later in Luke 2:19, Mary's response is to 'treasure up all these things and ponder them in her heart', but right now her heart is overflowing with joy, and she uses her voice to pour out praise and thanksgiving. Mary is the first person to experience authentic salvation – the good news - and she proclaims it extravagantly.

In the busyness of Advent and the Christmas holiday season, it can be easy to forget that sometimes out most generous gift is the time and attention we offer to others. May this Advent and Christmas be a time for each of us to kindle, or rekindle, a spirit of gratitude and our own verses of praise to the Lord and promises he has fulfilled and may we echo Mary's praise and thanksgiving for all that God has done for us.

#### **Affirmation of Faith**

We believe in God, Who came to this earth as a child, Was born to unmarried teenage parents, And was quickly made a refugee. We believe that this child grew up to heal the sick, See the poor, Dine with outcasts, Welcome foreigners, Wash the feet of sinners, Offer second chances, And bless the children. And so we believe that Christmas is only the beginning. The dream does not end with a manger. The dream ends with God's promised day. So until all God's children are home, We will follow the Magi's lead-Walking, seeking, and looking up. May it be so, for this we believe. Amen.

#### Prayer

Divine Voice, In the beginning, it was you, who spoke through angels; to Mary and Joseph and the Shepherds.

You have always been speaking in words, in memories, in songs, and in dreams. This Advent and Christmas, as we prepare to hear your word read aloud, we ask that you speak to us, once again, so that we might speak this same Good News to others. **Amen.**


FAMILY

Dear Friends,

I hope you are keeping well and it's good to give you an update on the Living Hope School. I am writing this newsletter from Paisley, Scotland. I moved here for my new appointment to minister in a few churches here, which started on the 1st of September. It has been really busy but I am enjoying being here. People are lovely and I feel that God has a plan and purpose for me in this place. You all are in my prayers as Living Hope School and I are in yours.

All of our students, teachers, and their families are safe. The infection rate is still very low in Baddomalhi. The school reopened at the beginning of August but all the schools were closed down twice due to a rise in Covid infection in the neighbouring areas. The school reopened again on the 20th of September and all the students are back in school receiving lessons. All the covid measures are in place and hopefully children over 11 years old will start to receive their vaccination.

Most of the adult population in Baddomalhi has been vaccinated. We upgraded some of the old computers and our students are making the most of the technology. Computers and tablets have been hugely beneficial to their learning so we are still looking at buying more tablets.

## Some memorable Moments with Cats by Andrew T.

## No. 3 Perkins (or was it Purr-kins?) by Andrew T.

The story of Perkins takes some telling. When Valerie and I moved into our house in 1969 Perkins was the long established neighbourhood moggie. He belonged to a couple who lived at the end of our terrace. He was already 'getting on'; had a shabby coat of a non-descript colour, lacy ears which carried the scars of past battles and we understood him to have both sight and hearing impairments.

A length of 6ft. high 'feather-board' fence separated us from our neighbours. It extended away from the houses for about 10ft to a post where it adjoined a lower chain link fence down the remainder of the garden. Just beyond the post was our rather dilapidated garden shed which had a shallow pitched roof. On many occasions we saw Perkins carefully make his way towards the shed (his left paws on top of the fence, his right paws down on the arris rail) which was a favoured spot for sunning himself.

I now suggest you visualise the following scene in 'cartoon strip' mode – not with a sleek and agile *Tom* as in '*Tom* & *Jerry*' but with a feline who, to put it mildly, was past his prime. We were both in our back room one afternoon when Perkins appeared on the fence and began making his way along to the wooden post where, after pausing, he launched himself towards the shed – except that it wasn't there – we had replaced it with a small greenhouse a day or two before!

I imagine it came as a painful surprise to discover that instead of landing on a felt roof he was now spread-eagled across the ridge of the greenhouse roof. I leave it to your imagination to fill the 'speech bubble' emanating from his mouth.

Perkins, finding himself in this predicament realised that he had to get back to the security of the fence. Slowly he manoeuvred himself around to return the way he had come. Having got himself off the ridge he squatted on a pane of glass ready to spring back to the post. Unfortunately, as he was sizing up the jump his rear paws began to slip on the glass, causing him to misjudge his leap. For a moment it seemed he was destined to clear the fence completely, but at the very last second, just as he was about to disappear from our view, he dropped his right front paw and clung onto the very top of the fence. There was a clatter as his body rattled against the other side. All we could see was part of his paw dug unto the fence. After several long seconds, another paw and then his head appeared. He slowly hauled himself up. Then very gingerly he returned along the fence to where he got down on our neighbours' side.

Although amusing to witness I'm sure the incident really shook him up. I think with that experience he had just about used up all his nine lives.



## **COOKERY CORNER**

## Yorkshire Parkin

## **Ingredients**

125gr (4 oz) butter175gr. (6 oz) black treacle150ml (¼ pint) milk175gr. (6 oz) medium oatmeal175gr. (6 oz) self-raising flour125 gr. (4 oz) dark muscovado sugar2 level teaspoons ground gingerI medium egg, beaten18cm (7 in.) tin, lined with greaseproof paper

## <u>Method</u>

- 1. Pre-heat oven to gas mark 2, 160°C, 320°F,
- 2. Place the butter, treacle and milk into a pan, heat gently until butter has melted.
- 3. Add the flour, oatmeal, sugar and ginger, then beat in the egg.
- 4. Pour mixture into the lined tin and bake in the centre of the oven for 1 hour, or until the centre of the cake is firm to touch.
- 5. Remove cake from the oven and leave to cool in the tin for 15—20 minutes, then transfer to a wire rack to cool completely.
- 6. When cold, wrap in clean greaseproof paper, then foil, and keep in a cool place for 3 to 4 days before eating.


