4. Getting a meal on board

Many years ago in connection with my work I had to go to Newcastle for the day. I'd caught a local train to London before 6 o'clock in the morning, then made my way to King's Cross for the journey north. Arriving mid-morning I was picked up by a colleague, taken to her office where I read through an extensive file. After a sandwich lunch she took me to a local address where I had a lengthy interview with a couple, before making my way back to my colleague's office for a further conversation with her.

She delivered me back to Newcastle Central station for a return train to London late afternoon. I planned to treat myself to a meal on the train which I would off-set against an evening meal allowance to which I was entitled for being away from home all day. The first call for dinner came just as we left Newcastle. Feeling that I'd rather eat a little later I decided to wait for the second sitting to be called.

This proved a bad decision. As the train approached York it was announced that the kitchen staff were going off-duty and the dining car was now closed! So I ended up having a 'scratch meal' at home sometime after 9pm. One or two proverbs spring to mind!

Back in 1981 Valerie and I shared a Scottish holiday with Joan and Audrey. In those days an overnight MotorRail service was available and we were returning from Inverness at 7.30pm. The vehicles were driven on to a rake of closed wag-

ons waiting at a goods platform, while the passengers made their way to the sleeping cars assembled at another platform. Being the last day of our holiday we looked forward to a celebratory meal in the dining car.

As the whistle blew for the train to leave so we heard the announcement for passengers wanting evening dinner to make their way to the dining car. It was a long train and to our dismay when we eventually got there the steward informed us that all seats had been taken! What were we going to do? We hadn't eaten much all day in anticipation of this meal. There were several other passengers in the same predicament. The steward said we could eat with the staff but this would not be until 9.30pm. So that's what we and half a dozen other passengers did. The portions were enormous because the remaining food was being finished up. All very well, but we didn't leave the table till after 11pm and weren't then ready to turn in straight away.

While the dining steward had been explaining that we would have to eat later, the train had come to a halt outside the station. It then began to slowly reverse to couple up with the wagons carrying the cars. There was a significant lurch as the two portions came together. The guard, who was standing nearby, remarked, *"It happens every time – we couple-up just as the soup is being served!"*

LETTER FROM RICCI SOCIAL SERVICES, MACAU

Several people in our church have been supporting Ricci Social Services for many years, via donations to Andrew Tredinnick via "The Tin". This is an extract from their latest letter.

The Joy to learn how to walk closer in order to serve better

To learn is to look for answers to questions. To serve is also to accompany others to learn how to find answers to their own questions: questions about their past, questions about their present situation, or questions about their future. Most of the persons we serve in Casa Ricci are facing very challenging situations: Pain and suffering due to their physical condition, family and social discrimination, poverty and insufficient education, deep feelings of loneliness, guilt, shame and inferiority, uncertainty regarding their future, fear of dying, etc. It will be useless for them to hear our own answers to these complex situations, no matter how "professional" they may sound. For this reason, in Ricci Social Services to be professional have always meant: 1) to learn how to walk closer to the persons we serve, 2) to learn how to understand their questions, and 3) to learn how to help them find their personal answers to these questions.

Only by walking closer to the persons we want to serve, we can understand their own questions. And only by understanding their questions, we can help them find their personal answers to these questions. This kind of learning is quite challenging and full of uncertainties.

The Chinese character to learn (學) shows a child sitting quietly in front of a desk. The earliest inscriptions of the character shows a person making an offering in a temple. Only with this kind of humble and respectful attitude expressed in this character we can learn how to serve in Ricci Social Ser-

vices. This requires from us to approach each person A reality with great respect and humility, knowing that our desire to be closer to them will never be strong enough, our efforts to understand their questions will be quite insufficient, and our knowledge or capacity to help him or her find their answers or solutions will always be limited.

n this issue of Encounter we would like to share with you some stories about how we learn in Casa Ricci. Each story is quite unique. But all of them have something in common: Our desire to serve better motivates us to learn more, and by learning more we make our service more joyful! All of them are stories inspired in the story of Emmanuel, that little baby born in Bethlehem. The one who learnt how to become man, "not to be served, but to serve, and to give his life as a ransom for many." (Mt 20:28)

I wish all of you a Merry Christmas and a 2023 full of Hope!

COOKERY CORNER

Gypsy Tart

Ingredients

Prepared pastry flan case

225 gr. (8 oz) light soft brown sugar

Small tin of evaporated milk (chilled)

<u>Method</u>

- 1. Prepare and bake blind a pastry case or flan case
- 2. Place milk in a bowl and mix in sugar slowly until fairly stiff.
- Place the mixture in the warm pastry case and place in a hot oven 180°F/160°C/Gas mark 4 and cook until mixture sets (10-15 minutes) Do NOT allow the mixture to bubble or it will spoil.
- 4. Allow to cool before serving
