

LETTER FROM THE MINISTER

Friends, Jesus Christ rose from the dead which is the key to the Christian faith. John Stott, in his book, The Cross of Christ, gives us three main things that the Cross of Christ achieved.

The first is that the Cross saved sinners. This is something that is already accomplished. And so, Charles Wesley could write: 'Bold I approach the eternal throne and claim the crown through Christ my own'. This is a message that runs through the life and ministry of Jesus Christ. At His birth, the name he was given is 'Jesus' and the meaning according to the Angel of Annunciation is, 'He will save his people from their sins'. So, St. Paul was not speaking amiss when he told the Corinthians, 'for I resolved to know nothing while I was with you except Jesus Christ and him crucified'. (1 Corinthians 2:2). The ministry of Jesus was about the salvation of sinners.

The second achievement of the Cross is that it revealed to us something of the nature of God. To understand any human being, one of the things to look out for is the choices that the person makes in life. The type of spouse, car, house, colours, school, friends, and vocation and lifestyles that people choose say more about them than whatever they say about themselves. The nature of the God we serve is revealed to us by the choice of the cross as the means of human salvation. The Cross makes the ultimate mission statement of Christianity, and that is, the Creator God was willing to choose shame and humiliation in order to bring redemption to the work of his

hands.

The third achievement of the Cross identified by John Stott is the conquest of evil. Evil is anything whether physical or spiritual, visible or invisible that is inimical to human life and salvation. So, Jesus defined evil when he referred to the devil as one who comes but 'to steal, kill and destroy'. When evil is conquered, what replaces it is life, the abundance of life that Jesus promised in John 10:10. The Cross of Christ conquered evil so that those who are in Christ will experience Eternal Life. In addition to sin, evil has manifested in our world in many ways including the blind pursuit of materialism to the detriment of making a difference to the lives of others.

The Cross transform everything, renews our relationship with God, provides new incentives for the church to pursue mission and for both the church and the individuals. The Cross of Christ gives us a new courage to face the perplexities of suffering. It is our sins that put Christ on the Cross and so we have to stand before it with bowed heads and broken spirits.

Wishing you a PEACEFUL EASTER CELEBRATION.

Andrew's Railway Journeys

5. Choose your route carefully

From time to time we visit our nephew and his family at Reading and opt to travel by train. The quickest route is via Paddington, but this involves an Underground journey across London. The alternative is to travel from Waterloo. Although this takes slightly longer, it has the advantage that because our local trains stop at Waterloo East, only a short walk is required to reach the main-line station where a train to Reading can be caught, thereby avoiding the need to take the tube.

On one of our journeys via Waterloo we noticed that some passengers joining our train at London Bridge were 'elegantly dressed', and when we got to the main-line station we realised why. The concourse was thronged with ladies in smart hats and men in suits all going to the race meeting at Ascot, which of course was on our route!

We did manage to get seats, but the train quickly filled up and by departure time it was 'standing room' only. As we pulled into Clapham Junction the platform was crammed with more race-goers. Somehow they all managed to squeeze on board. Although it was only mid-morning, many of the Ascot race passengers had already consumed some alcohol, and our carriage certainly had the feel of a party atmosphere. At Ascot the train emptied and we enjoyed a quiet conclusion to our journey.

Coming home we decided to leave after 6.30pm giving time, we thought, for the race crowd to disperse. How wrong we were. At Ascot the train again filled up to capacity, but this time the race-goers were even more 'merry'. Shouted conver-

sations were taking place both across and up and down the carriage. Included in the throng near us was an 'Ascot steward' dressed in his smart green livery. A silly conversation developed involving 3 or 4 of the passengers nearest to us as to whether another traveller was an Australian, or a 'Kiwi' as he claimed. They suspected the former which for some reason made them feel he should not be on the train. They began urging the 'Ascot steward' to remove him. Fortunately, one of the group realised that the tenor of the conversation was probably not appreciated by us as non-race-goers, and he encouraged the others to 'respect' our presence. Good humour prevailed. The antipodean was allowed to stay and our inebriated fellow travellers behaved themselves for the rest of the journey.

Lesson learnt: don't travel that way when there is a race meeting at Ascot. As the train also called at Twickenham, it would probably be wise to avoid international rugby fixtures as well.

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We had a not dissimilar experience on the Heart of Wales line when we found we had chosen to travel to Knighton the same day as the Royal Welsh Show was taking place at Builth Wells. Our train filled up with local farmers looking forward to a day out. One guy I remember in particular, he wore a heavy greatcoat which nearly reached his ankles. When he opened the coat up, it was lined with many pockets on each side, everyone containing a small bottle of spirits!

Organised by the churches and community of Anerley



COOKERY CORNER Simnel Cake

Ingredients

175gr (6oz) butter or margarine

175gr (6oz) soft brown sugar

3 medium eggs

100gr (4oz) sultanas

250gr (9oz) self-raising flour

25gr (1oz) quartered glacé cherries
pinch of salt

100gr (4oz) chopped mixed peel

1 x 25ml spoon (½ teaspn) mixed spice

450gr(1 lb) almond paste

5 x 15ml spoon (3 tablespns) milk

apricot jam

2 x 5ml spoons (2 teaspns) golden syrup

beaten egg to glaze

Method

- 1. Heat oven 180°C/350°F/Gas mark 4.
- 2. grease and line a 20.5cm (8 inch) round cake tin.
- 3. Beat fat and sugar, add eggs one at a time, with a little flour.
- 4. Stir in salt and spice, add milk and syrup with a little more flour, and mix well.
- 5. Fold in the remaining flour and fruit, place half the mixture into the prepared tin, and smooth level.
- 6. Divide almond paste (marzipan) in two, roll out one portion into a 20.5cm (8 inch) round on sugared greaseproof paper, remove and place on top of the cake mixture.
- 7. Cover with the remaining cake mixture and bake for about an hour, then reduce the temperature to 140°C/275°F/Gas Mark 1 and bake for 2½ hours.
- 8. Allow the cake to cool and divide the remaining almond paste into two

- 9. Roll one half of the paste into a 20.5cm (8 inch) round, brush the cake with apricot jam and place the rolled almond paste on top of the cake.
- 10. Roll the remaining paste into eleven small balls.
- 11. Brush the top of the cake with beaten egg and place balls of paste round the edge, close together, then brush again with egg.
- 12. Place under a hot grill to brown marzipan.
