GENERAL CHURCH MEETING

The Annual Church Meeting will be held during the morning service on **Sunday 6th August 2023**.

This is an opportunity for anyone to ask questions about the life and mission of the Church. All Church Members are encouraged to attend this meeting.

In addition it is this meeting which appoints the Church Stewards and elects representatives to the Church Council for the next year. We are in need of more Church Stewards, as we have very few at the moment, which puts an undue strain on the present Stewards. We would also welcome more members of the Church Council, to ensure a wider representation of our membership. Information on Church Stewards and the Church Council is given below. Should you wish to stand, either as a Church Steward or as a representative to the Church Council, Nomination Forms will be available shortly which should be returned to Marian as soon as possible <u>before the meeting</u>,

FUNCTIONS OF THE CHURCH COUNCIL

The official description of the functions of the Church Council, as given in the "Constitution, Practice and Discipline of the Methodist Church" is as follows.

603 The Church Council. The Church Council has authority and oversight over the whole area of the ministry of the church, including the management of its property. Aims and methods, the determination and pursuit of policy and the deployment of available resources are its proper responsibility. In many cases it will appoint committees which will have authority, in their own areas of responsibility, to initiate action, co-ordinate the work done in the church, advise the Church Council and report to it, being subject to its authority and

oversight.

614 Responsibilities. The general oversight of the Local Church shall be undertaken by the Church Council, exercising leadership over the whole field of the church's concern.

In practice the Church Council meets twice a year to consider reports on the various areas of the work of the church (e.g. property, finance, youth work etc), to consider any matters relating to the life of the church and to consider any matters referred to it by the Circuit or District. If you have an interest in how our local church functions, then consider serving on the Church Council.

Please note that, to serve on the Church Council, you must be a Member of the Methodist Church .

WHAT DO CHURCH STEWARDS DO?

Church stewards have been around since the 18th century when John Wesley recognised that ministers, who because of the itinerant nature of their role, are often unable to oversee every matter in church life. And so, the role is tightly woven into the DNA of the Connexion.

While church stewards are responsible for practical things, such as looking after local preachers who are visiting their church, making sure the offering is taken and announcements are made that's not where it ends! There are also responsibilities which have more of an overarching reach. For example, church stewards focus on fostering unity within the church and 'talent spotting' those with potential, encouraging them to become involved in leadership roles.

They also make sure that any new policies which are made by Synod and the Church Council are communicated to their congregation, ensuring that decisions are upheld and acted upon.

Some of the responsibilities church stewards have are...

Contacting the visiting local preacher before the service to fill them in on the traditions and customs of their church. For example at what point in the service the offering is taken and if the children leave during the service to attend their own activities.

Welcoming the local preacher before the service.

The preacher might have travelled quite a distance or feel nervous, so a friendly face and prayer will probably be most appreciated.

Looking after the local preacher when the service is over. Church stewards should always ensure that the local preaches has an invitation to a meal after the service and should offer to pay their travelling expenses.

Working with others.

Collaborating and cooperating with those who are also involved in the Sunday service, for example worship leaders, organists, crèche and Sunday School leaders to ensure that the service runs smoothly.

Greeting all churchgoers.

Whether they are new faces or old friends it is vital that people feel welcomed in our churches. A genuine smile can make all the difference! Often Welcome Teams are set up.

Attending official church meetings.

These include the Circuit Meeting, the Church Council, the General Church Meeting and the Pastoral Committee.

Keeping up to date with safeguarding matters.

The Methodist Church has produced a specialist guide on safeguarding, Encircled in Care, (copies of which are available in the Vestry)

Organising an alternative service if the appointed preacher does not turn up! If there is a minister or another local preacher in the congregation ask if they would be happy to help out. In the event that there is not spare local preacher to hand the church steward will need to step into the breach. Copies of services which would be appropriate to use in these tight spots, called Readers' Services, are available on the Methodist Website.

Church stewards and the Sunday experience

The practical duties church stewards carry out are crucial to creating a positive experience both for the visiting local preacher or minister and the congregation on a Sunday morning.

For many people the Sunday service, rather than housegroups or interest groups, is where they find their main point of connection with the church. More churches are also finding that a growing percentage of their congregations feel a strong sense of belonging but are unable to attend every week. For churchgoers, and for the regulars, there is an even greater need for continuity and quality in the church service. *(Taken from the Methodist Church Website)*

At Anerley, Stewards prepare the Chapel for services and pray with the preacher in the vestry before the service, on a rota basis.

Please note that to be a Church Steward you must be a recognised Member of the Methodist Church. Church Stewards are appointed annually and usually serve for a total of six years

7. Hailing a train

Many years ago we were on holiday in the west of Scotland staying in a caravan near to Arisaig, which had a railway station served by trains on the Fort William to Mallaig line.

One day Valerie and I decided to go for an afternoon walk. Being Scotland, access to the countryside is more open than in England and not restricted to public rights of way. The OS map revealed that we could wander across country for about 5 miles to reach another station, Beasedale, an unmanned halt, in the 'middle of nowhere'. The nearest community was 1½ miles away.

There were only four services a day, so it was important we covered the ground in time to catch a train to return us to Arisaig by late afternoon. A note in the timetable showed Beasedale as a request stop which meant a hand signal had to be given to the driver. We arrived with a few minutes to spare, walking the last couple of hundred yards along the sleepers, and waited on a short platform just bearing a board displaying the station name. There were no facilities and unlike many stations today no electronic indicator board showing departures/destinations.

Eventually we heard the mighty roar of a class 37 diesel locomotive in the distance. Slowly it came round a curve and we watched as it toiled up the gradient towards the station with five carriages in tow. I duly thrust out my arm in a commanding fashion, and felt a measure of satisfaction and relief when I successfully halted the 'beast'. No one got off and we were the only passengers joining the train. After a pause and then a blast on the whistle from the guard, the locomotive roared into action again and we were underway. We completed the journey back to Arisaig in a matter of minutes. As far as I can recall the guard did not come to collect our fares and when we left the train there were no staff at the station to issue tickets. So we had a free ride!

COOKERY CORNER

Apple Amber

Cooking time 30 mins. Oven temp. 400°F/Mark 6/ 200°C

Ingredients

100 gr (4 oz) shortcrust pastry made with 100gr (4 oz) flour, 25gr (1 oz) lard, 25gr (1 oz) margarine.

Meringue topping: 2 egg whites, 50gr (2 oz) sugar.

Filling:

450gr (1 lb) apples	2 egg yolks
50gr (2 oz) margarine	grated rind & juice of 1 lemon
50gr (2 oz) sugar	

<u>Method</u>

- 1. Peel, core and slice apples..
- 2. Cook until a purée with the sugar, margarine and lemon juice
- 3. Line a dish with the pastry, add the egg yolks to the apple mixture and pour into the dish.
- 4. Bake for $\frac{1}{2}$ hour in the centre of the oven.
- Whisk the egg whites until stiff, adding sugar gradually. Pile on top of the apple amber and bake for a further ¼ hour at 325°F/Mark 3/170°C to brown the peaks.
