

Dear Friends,

I hope you are keeping well. It is so good to bring you the updates on Living Hope School. The children have settled in after their summer holiday. They are all doing well.

This summer we had lots of strong storms in Baddomalhi and most of our solar panels were blown away and the rest were badly damaged. We were able to restore and replace them before the start of the school. We are so grateful to have them in place. Otherwise, electricity would have been very costly since the prices of electricity and fuel have risen recently. This is unfortunately due to an economic and political crisis happening in Pakistan.

This year has been tough for Christians in Pakistan after the incident in Jariwala and surrounding villages where 19 churches and hundreds of houses of very poor families were burnt down. They lost everything over the night and spent the night hiding in the open fields. Thankfully no one lost their lives. This is something that always worries us as churches and Christian buildings get targeted regularly.

This year responding to the flood-affected families at Living Hope School, the Rotary Club Beckenham raised £2150.64 to donate essential food supplies. The Rotary Club of Beckenham has supported the school in so many ways over many years our students and their

families were very grateful to the Rotary Club of Beckenham for their efforts and support. Please pray for god's protection over Living Hope School and the Christians in Pakistan.

Everyone is greatly concerned about the recent events but it has strengthened the faith of Christian communities across the countries.

Andrew's Railway Journeys

9. Two episodes on miniature railways

One holiday when we were away with Hetty (Valerie's Mum) we visited the Beer Heights miniature railway in east Devon. The little train left from the Departure platform and after following a winding and twisting route through the attractive gardens completed its journey at an Arrival platform where everyone got off: except Hetty. By then, being well into her eighties, her walking was not very good but instead of expecting her to climb a footbridge to return to the station entrance, she was allowed to remain on the train while the carriages were shunted out of the platform to be repositioned once again for the next service from the Departure platform. I thought this was very considerate of the staff.

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Many years earlier, Valerie and I had been on holiday at Berwick-on-Tweed (near the Scottish border). A few miles away is the Heathershaw Light Railway which runs for a mile or so between the Heathershaw Corn Mill and Etal Castle, both promoted as visitor attractions.

We were on the first service of the day to the castle and had only travelled a couple of hundred yards when the train stopped and out jumped the driver with his shovel. He set about shovelling earth back under the track. This happened twice more during our journey. He explained that the rabbits thereabouts were a nightmare. They were forever burrowing into the sandy soil on which the track was laid. Drivers had to be especially vigilant to ensure the locomotive was not tipped over!

My Sponsored Walk, Petts Wood to Bridle Road, Shirley on 6th October 2023.

One of the benefits of a solo walk is being able to choose a day which suits me. A careful watch of the weather forecast means I can decide to walk when the weather is set fair.

My route followed Section 3 of the London Loop (London Outer Orbital Path) from Petts Wood to Coney Hall, plus an additional couple of miles into Section 4, finishing at Bridle Road, Shirley – a distance of some 12 miles.

The London Loop is a recreational trail around the outer London boroughs nearly 150 miles long. The 15 sections link together many open spaces circling the capital. I completed the entire path on separate day walks during 2009, 2010 & 2011.

I belong to the Ramblers Association and have become very familiar with Section 3. Back in early 2020, just before the Coronavirus pandemic, I responded to a request for members to volunteer to keep an eye on sections of the path. The duties aren't particularly onerous – just a commitment to walk the section every 3 months and report any obstacles and missing or damaged signage. Including the links at each end to Petts Wood station and Hayes station, Section 3 is about 10 miles long. Each quarter I alternate the direction of my walk which helps to check that the way-marking is in order. A

printed guide to the Loop is available, but these days many people turn to the *Transport for London* web-site for the very latest directions.

Leaving Petts Wood the initial couple of miles are level easy walking. Jubilee Park is the first green space encountered which is followed by a length of pavement walking before reaching an attractive stretch through Crofton Wood. A little later the path enters the Nature Reserve at Darrick & Newstead Woods all the while climbing gradually before emerging above Tubbenden Meadow providing a fine view to the south.

The route then drops down to cross the A21 before rising again to pass through Farnborough village and reach the churchyard of St. Giles the Abbot. The path follows the edge of a wide meadow alongside woods of the High Elms estate where, after crossing Shire Lane, I took a refreshment break at the nearby café.

Although the country house at High Elms was destroyed by fire back in the early 1960's a rare Eton Fives Court has survived. The route now negotiates its way via the local golf club to reach Bogey Lane, an ancient by-way. Shortly however, the path diverts into a field bordering the lane and steadily rises. As height is gained there are good views to the north and south. Not today, but on other occasions, I encountered deer hereabouts.

The field path re-joins Bogey Lane before meeting Farthing Street and descending steeply to cross Shire Lane again. On the hill ahead can be seen Holwood House, once the home of William Pitt (early 19th century Prime Minister). The path now begins to climb, steadily at first before culminating in a stiff

pull up just before the Wilberforce Oak. The site commemorates the decision taken by William Wilberforce, in conversation with William Pitt, to introduce a bill to Parliament abolishing the slave trade.

The wooded path through the Holwood estate is very attractive, but the scenery gets even better as the route enters the woods above Keston Ponds and gently drops down through the main car park to join the steep steps down to Caesar's Well. This is the source of the Ravensbourne which eventually makes its way out to the Thames at Deptford Creek. The Ponds, like High Elms, always attract a good number of people, but on several stretches of the path you can walk a mile or more without encountering another soul.

A short distance of pavement walking is required to pass through Keston village to gain a wooded path that follows the edge of an escarpment providing attractive glimpses into the valley below. Although the area now entered is generally known as Hayes Common, a short way along you in fact cross into West Wickham Common. This and Spring Park, met later on, are owned and cared for by the City of London Corporation. After passing the site of an Iron-Age settlement and a last view into the valley where model-like houses can be seen below, the path descends steeply to complete Section 3 beside several ancient oaks at the edge of Coney Hall. (The section I monitor includes the link to Hayes station along nearby Pole Cat Alley).

An alleyway and a short distance of pavement walking is necessary to pass through Coney Hall to reach the local recreation ground. Here, beside the path is a small stone marking the Greenwich Meridian: so in one stride I crossed from the eastern to the western hemisphere! There is a gradual climb to reach to the 13th century church of St. John the Baptist which stands isolated in what is a rural setting. The path makes its way through the churchyard and continues downhill across a large field which often has several horses and ponies, but not today.

Across Addington Lane the routes passes over the rugby pitches at Sparrows Den. It then climbs steeply into the woods of Spring Park. The woods here are delightful but obscure any views into the valley below. Along this stretch there used to be a stone marking the Kent/Surrey border but I did not see it today. The wooded path continues into Three-halfpenny Wood and eventually bursts through the trees to reach Shirley Heath which offers a view north towards the sky-scrapers of the city of London.

On the far side of the heath I reached the bridle way leading down to Bridle Road and journeys end. Section 4 of the London Loop, however, continues westwards towards Shirley Hills, Selsdon and Hamsey Green.

My sincere thanks to everyone who has sponsored me. I expect the total sum raised to be about £350. This, together with other monies raised during the year will enable the Christian Action Group to finance a desk-top computer for a school in Ghana as well as support various other good causes.
