

11. Missing a connection and missing seats!

In 2000 I walked the White Peak Way (a circuit of the limestone country in the Peak District). I was travelling from St. Pancras to Sheffield where I was meeting my colleague, Dave, who was coming from Oxford on a Cross Country service. He was due to arrive shortly before me, leaving a twenty minute wait for a connecting service to Grindleford, where our walk commenced. It was important we didn't miss that train, otherwise we faced a two hour wait for the next one.

My train left London five minutes late. At first I wasn't particularly concerned but as the journey progressed we seemed to be losing time. When the ticket inspector came round I told him I was meeting a friend at Sheffield and that we had to make the connection. He assured me I should not worry and said he was sure everything would be all right. When he came past again I stressed the importance of getting the local train because when we got to Grindleford we faced a ten mile walk to reach our lodgings for the night. Again he said not to get concerned as he would phone ahead and ask for the local train to be held.

However, my train got later and later. I rang Dave to explain I was delayed. The guard then came to tell me 'the powers that be' would not hold the other train but instead would lay on a taxi.

When I eventually got to Sheffield and met up with my companion, we were joined by another passenger who had also missed the connection. He was going to a station some 15 miles further on. True to their word the railway company pro-

vided a taxi to deliver us to Grindleford. As we left the cab we heard the driver ask his remaining passenger whether he knew the way to his destination because he didn't! We were left wondering whether they ever made it!

Back in 1989 I was tackling the West Highland Way with Tony Fryer (our Group Scout Master) and Keith Sherlock (Group Chairman). I believe it was a time when there was a dispute on the Underground so we had to walk from Charing Cross to Euston station to catch the service to Glasgow. We had booked seats on the train, but on getting on board were informed that for 'operational reasons' the expected rolling stock had been replaced with another set of carriages which had a different seating plan and fewer seats.

Rather than compete for seats with other passengers, we made our way to the luggage van at the rear of the train, where the guard allowed us to sprawl out on the floor. He said once the train had emptied a bit we should be able to find seats. He was quite right, but not until we had left Preston! One fact I particularly remember was that the luggage van had several small purpose made holes in the floor, presumably to enable it to be hosed down and cleaned. Looking though one of these holes as the sleepers sped by underneath was quite mesmerising!

THE GREAT FLOOD

No, this isn't Noah and the Ark! Something a bit closer to home.

On 29th January a Thames Water main in Minden Road burst which flooded the entire church premises to a depth of 2" to 4", cascading from the top hall down into the entrance hall and church.. Fortunately, our side hall seems to have sustained no lasting damage and the electrics were unaffected.

The Thames Water flood mitigation team (Flood Call) were on site within 5 hours of the burst being discovered and remained on site until midnight on the day of the flood. Flood Call has been amazing in their response, and they will be overseeing the repairs going forward. The water has been drained from the premises and equipment is installed throughout to dry the building. Thames Water have accepted responsibility, and we are working with their Loss Adjuster and flood mitigation team to undertake repairs.

The Pre-School staff worked hard to clean and disinfect the top hall and it was due to their efforts that Pre-school was able to resume after three days. We are very grateful to them for all that they did. All our other users have been accommodated.


All floors in the top half of the building, and the entrance hall and small kitchen below, will need to be lifted to dry the under -floor and then lay new flooring, so going forward some disruption to activities will be inevitable. We expect all floors to be re-laid and remedial work undertaken by 14th April with the majority of the work being undertaken during the school Easter holiday.

The carpet in the church has been removed, and the contractor has now started work on repairing the floor of the church. Once this is completed, the new carpet will be laid. We hope that we shall soon be back worshipping in the church.

The Thames Water Loss Adjuster has agreed to an interim payment of £5K to compensate for the additional energy costs of running heating and fans continuously and to enable the photocopier to be replaced

The church owes a great debt of thanks and appreciation to David and Sandra, for all their efforts both with negotiations with Thames Water and in clearing up after the event., and to them and our Church Stewards in enabling our Sunday services to continue in the Side Hall or the Top Hall each week.

PROPOSED CHANGES TO THE CIRCUIT

The Rev. Richard Grocott, our Superintendent Minister, is leaving the Circuit in August 2025, and it is unlikely that he will be replaced. This would mean there will be a probable reduction from 4 Ministers to 3 Ministers, to cover 9 churches.

The Circuit Way Forward group have considered some of the issues involved in this, and have prepared a set of proposals which have been discussed with, and agreed by, the Ministers and the Circuit Leadership team.

The proposals are as follows:

The nine circuit churches would be combined into three 'stations' in the North (Eltham Park, Lewisham and Sunfields), Middle (Burnt Ash, Forest Hill and Hither Green) and South (Anerley, Upper Norwood and Wesley Hall) sections of the circuit. These stations all had roughly 150 members in 2023.

From 2025, Revd Craig Gaffney would become Superintendent with pastoral responsibility for the Middle of the circuit; Revd William Davis would have pastoral responsibility for the South of the circuit; conditional on re-invitation, and until 2027 when he retires, Revd Charles Ilunga would have pastoral responsibility for the North of the circuit.

In the near future, Forest Hill and Wesley Hall congregations are expected to worship together at Wesley Hall while Forest Hill is rebuilt. During this period, Craig and William will share responsibility

for the joint congregation.

In view of the reduction in the number of ministers but no reduction in workload the Circuit would seek to employ additional administrative staff to support the ministers. They will also consider whether to employ other lay workers to help fill gaps identified by the circuit and member church mission plans.
