

Dear Friends, I hope you are keeping well. It is so good to bring you the updates on Living Hope School.

The children have settled in after their summer holiday and they are all doing well. Up till this point, we have not had a sufficient outdoor space for physical sports and other activities. The exciting news is that we hope to have an outdoor space to facilitate this but also to provide and extra learning space for the hot summer months. Incredibly, after some fundraising and your continued financial support, we have been able to purchase a small piece of land (708 Square Meters) to provide an exciting and engaging outdoor learning environment for our students to flourish.

We hope that this space will be ready by next summer; equipped with a gardening space and playing equipment. We will plant fast-growing trees for shelter and build canopies for outdoor classes. This will make it a suitable place all year round but especially for the later spring and summer months, which is when it gets really hot. During these months our usual classrooms are not ideal for learning especially when we have an unreliable supply of electricity to run cooling fans. Our solar panels cannot cope with the demand of having fans on in all the classes without the help of the main supply of electricity. With these facilities in place, the students will be able to continue their learning in their open-air space. This will be an exciting new addition to our school facilities. The children are very excited and are looking forward to their new place.

Living Hope is aiming to raise an extra £7000 to get the space ready and to be able to buy the outdoor equipment. As I am writing this letter, we are getting trucks full of landfill soil delivered! Living Hope school is very grateful to Andrew, Valery and our Anerley Methodist Church friends for raising £365 through afternoon teas. This money has already gone to help with the extension. Please also remember to pray for our teachers, students and their families.

Andrew's bus journeys

2. Our visit to John o' Groats

Although I have been to Lands End, at the south-west tip of Britain, on several occasions, at the age of 50 I was still to visit John o' Groats, the northern extremity of the British mainland. So to celebrate my birthday that year we decided to make a trip to the far north. We purchased a five-day North of Scotland Rail Rover which gave us unlimited access to the rail network north of Aberdeen. We travelled to the 'Granite City' by a direct train service from London and spent our first night there. We took rucksacks to save having to manage suitcases.

Next day we moved on to Inverness from where we caught the train to Wick. The service north from Inverness to Wick travels via Thurso which increases the distance to 175 miles. There are numerous stops which serve remote communities making the journey time some 4½ hours. It was shortly after the 'no-smoking' rule had been introduced on trains and to cater for passengers that need 'a quick puff' a couple of the stops were extended to over five minutes specifically to allow passengers to stretch their legs and 'light-up'.

We eventually arrived at Wick and looked for the bus stop outside the station from where, according to the timetable, we could expect to join our bus. There was no bus stop. All our fellow passengers had dispersed and the station appeared devoid of any staff. As we pondered what to do we then noticed at the far end of the station yard a double-deck bus, together with a driver. We wandered across to see if this was our service. "No", the driver replied adding, "I'm just off to the High School shortly on a school-run". I asked where we should wait for the John o Groat's bus and he responded, "Sometimes it comes by the station and sometimes it doesn't! It starts from the school so hop on and I'll take you there". We duly got on board and chatted with the driver until he was ready to leave. In a few minutes we reached the High School

where several other buses and coaches were lined-up waiting for the children. "Don't get off yet – I'll tell you when your bus in here". In a little while he said, "It's the second bus behind me", so we got off and made our way to the John o' Groats service. We'd had a free ride from the station.

The single decker bus quickly filled up with youngsters, and after setting off stopped in the town centre to collect a few shoppers, then flew pass the station without any sign of slowing down and out into the wilds of Caithness on its 17 mile journey. As we journeyed on the bus slowly emptied; sometimes stopping by a track or a gate where passengers set off across open country with no sign of habitation in sight.

Eventually we found ourselves the only remaining passengers, and as we crossed the brow of a low range of hills we could see the Pentland Firth and Orkney bathed in glorious late afternoon sunshine.

The bus pulled up at the small quay at John o' Groats and we made our way into the gift shop nearby to get our souvenirs before it closed for the day. Just like the *Tardis* it appeared larger inside than when seen outside! We were the only customers. Having made our purchases we walked to our accommodation, not the adjacent hotel but a small pub offering accommodation - half a mile inland at half the price!

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Having spent the night at the northern tip of the British mainland we now had to make our return to Inverness. We had travelled out via Wick, one of the two termini of the Far North of Scotland line but we were returning from Thurso the other terminus. At breakfast I asked the landlady whether the Thurso bus left from the quay. "Sometimes it does, and sometimes it doesn't" came the reply, "It depends on the weather". As the morning was fine and clear we

took the chance and made our way back to the quay for a 9.30am departure.

We were the only passengers waiting. At just about half past nine a double deck bus appeared. A sole female passenger got off who later told us that she was from Essex and like us had always wanted to visit John o' Groats.

I asked the driver if he was returning to Thurso. "Yes", he answered, "but not in this bus. This is a school run and I'm now off to get the single decker – won't be long!" With that he drove off leaving the two of us standing there wondering when we would next see him. We had not noticed a depot anywhere about but some ten minutes later he duly returned in a smaller vehicle.

It is about 15 miles to Thurso – not far but every so often the driver would turn of the main road to reach a farm or a cluster of cottages. There he would perform a three point turn, wait a minute or two to see if anyone wanted to get on board and then return to the main road to resume the journey which of course extended the travelling time significantly. For a much of the way we were the only passengers

Although I am describing events of over 25 years ago, ticket machines had been in regular use on buses elsewhere for years. Here, however, the driver had a biscuit tin to hold his change and a supply of individual paper tickets to give to passengers!

All in all a memorable experience.



A Policeman's Lot - What's the point?



It seems to me that the task of 'point duty' is a skill no longer practiced by today's police officers.

I guess as a young Constable one either loved or loathed it – not much

fun in the rain when one invariably got soaked as well as risking life and limb trying to stop cars on a wet road! Other than that, I always felt it was an 'art form' if done well and I suppose if I am honest, it gave one a feeling of power and authority over the commuting drivers.

We had two traffic points, one in Denmark Hill just up the hill from Kings College Hospital where motorists coming down the hill tried hard to look the other way rather than obey the pointed and raised hand of the officer directing the traffic. Amazing how much of interest there was on the left hand side of the road!

I recall on one occasion a driver studiously ignored my signal to stop and in exasperation I was tempted to bang on the car door as he sailed under my arm – this resulted in a dent appearing in the door – Knowing I was in trouble, I left the traffic to sort itself out and walked down the hill to where the offending car had stopped. The driver – irate rather than chastened - got out of his car and viewed the dent before slamming the door to remonstrate with me.

Well luck or the Almighty must have been on my side as when he slammed the door – lo and behold! The dent popped out! As he fumed about the dent I was smugly able to say 'what dent?' and go on to chastise him for 'failing to stop for a

constable'. I thought it best not to report him!

The other favourite and much sought after point was in Peckham Road at the junction with Southampton way - further to walk from the station - but it did have one perk. The junction was opposite a Kennedy's pie shop and bakery. Provided that the points-man assisted Kennedy's vans into the rush hour traffic, when one returned to the nearby police box the small window would open and a brown bag of hot sausage rolls would be delivered. Very welcome on a cold winter's day but it was always wise - if you wanted to get posted to that point in future - not to forget the Section Sergeant and make sure he got his share of the pies!

I remember submitting a report suggesting that both these points be fitted with traffic lights – the report was rejected on the grounds of cost, but both junctions now have traffic lights. Cheaper but less romantic! Clearly I was ahead of my time.
